



Hello Homemakers! Apples a dash of lemon juice. Chill and queen of Canadian fruits, reign when beginning to set, add a table-spoon of chopped nuts. Pour into wet moulds, chill and then unmould you cannot use apples and usually they are "never-fail" recipes. In spite of the fact that the old stand-bys, applesauce and apple pie, are always the family's favourites, there are indications that readers want to add new dishes to their repertoire.

**Take a Tip**  
 1. Apple sauce, smooth and clear, may be combined with cooked rice and whipped cream. Chill and serve with a spoonful of red jelly.  
 2. Apple sauce is something different when jellied and served with custard or cream. Pour 2 cups of sauce through a sieve, then add to softened gelatine (one tablespoon or pie pastry are scrummy if you gelatine in 1/4 cup cold water). Add

425 degs. for 15 to 20 mins.  
 6. Apple Pandowdy is the good old-fashioned pudding. To make it fill a pudding dish with peeled and cored tart apples, then add one or two tablespoons water unless apples are very juicy. Sprinkle with sugar and season with nutmeg, top with baking powder biscuit dough. Bake in electric oven at 375 degrees for 20 minutes. Serve with a maple cream sauce.  
 7. Apple Crisp is our quickie. Peel and slip apples off the cores into greased casserole. Add one-third cup water and 1 tbs lemon juice. Rub one-third cup hard butter and 1/2 cup granulated sugar together and sprinkle over the top. Bake in an electric oven at 350 degrees for 25 minutes or with an oven meal for 40 minutes.

**Apple Pie**  
 3 cups sliced apples, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, grated rind 1/2 lemon, 1 tablespoon butter.  
 Line pie plate with paste. Turn in apples and sprinkle with sugar, salt, cinnamon, lemon juice and lemon rind. Dot with small bits of butter. Put on top crust pushing it gently toward the centre. Press edges together and trim. Bake in an electric oven 400 degs. F. for 50 minutes.

**Apple Cheese and Cherry Salad**  
 4 tart apples, 15 maraschino cherries, 3 packages cream cheese, mayonnaise.  
 Peel apples and cut into small balls with French vegetable cutter. Form cream cheese into balls, making eight small balls from each nest. Garnish with maraschino cherries and mayonnaise. Serve additional mayonnaise.

**The Question Box**  
 Mrs. S. M. asks: What apple varieties do you recommend storing?  
 Answer: Greening, Newton, Northern Spy, Golden Russet, Stark are best kinds to store.

Mrs. B. A. asks: What is your method of canning apples?  
 Answer: Wash, pare, and quarter, or slice and drop into weak salt water to prevent discoloration. Blanch 1 1/2 minutes Cold-dip. Pack in sterilized jars, and cover with water or thin syrup (1 cup sugar, 4 cups water) to overflowing. Half-seal. Sterilize 60 minutes.

**THE SEARCHLIGHT OF PUBLICITY**

 The sensational charges of "warmongering" against the United States made by Soviet delegate Vishinsky in the United Nations General Assembly recall similar charges made by Hitler against Great Britain before that last World War. It will be remembered that Hitler, in his periodical hysterical outburst, named certain politicians and other leading men in Britain as "warmongers." Mr. Vishinsky has mimicked the German dictator by naming Americans who have insisted upon a firm stand against the duplicity and aggression of the Soviet and its domination of the United Nations by means of the veto.

Lloyd George was one of the first to call upon the British Government to "Stand up to the dictators!" Hitler hated Winston Churchill for his persistent efforts in parliament and out to awaken the Government and the people of Britain to the growing menace of Nazi Germany. The fuhrer furiously denounced Mr. Churchill as a "warmonger." If there had been a few similar "warmongers" at that time in high position in the United States, there would have been no Second World War. But Churchill was a voice crying in the wilderness.

The situation is very different today. The United States government and the American people are fully awake to the Hitlerian tactics and propaganda of the Soviet. Hitler did not want a world war, neither does Stalin today. The angry outburst of Vishinsky is a case of chagrin at being detected and exposed in a virtual annexation of occupied territory and the renewal of Communist fifth-column movement for "world revolution."

Mr. Vishinsky is quite correct in accusing Americans of propaganda, but it would be more correctly termed counter-propaganda. It is the propaganda of the searchlight. "Men love darkness rather than light, because their deeds are evil," and the Russian leaders are writhing and squealing under the glare of publicity. The searchlight has penetrated the screen that has been thrown around Eastern Europe since the close of the war, revealing the ruthless extermination of national leaders who dare to oppose or utter a word against the Soviet plans for creation of puppet states which are eventually to be absorbed in the Russian Empire.

Poland, Bulgaria, Roumania, Hungary and Yugoslavia have all been brought into subjection to the Soviet. They are termed "democracies of a special nature," but they are only transitional on the way to complete absorption. Czechoslovakia is the only country within the Russian encirclement that is not completely subjected to Communist suppression, but even that country is under Soviet dictatorship in regard to international affairs.

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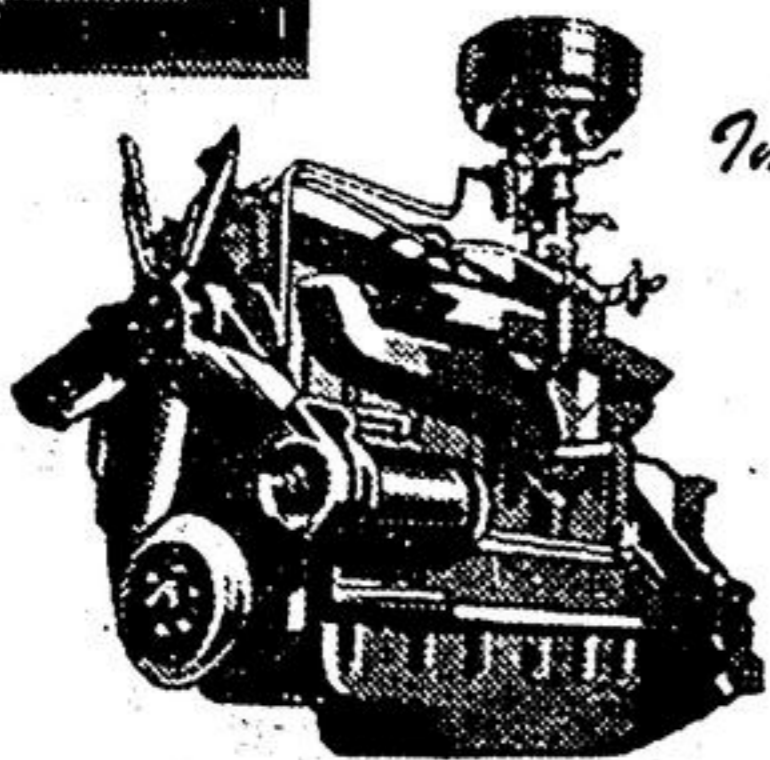
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
