Following several weeks illness Samuel Albert Beverley passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Cecil Harper, Utica, on Monday, October 13th, 1947, in his 80th year. The funeral took place to Kendall Cemetery, Utica, October 15th, services being conducted by Rev. L. E. Atkinson.

The late Samuel Albert Beverley was born in Reach Township in 1867, a son of the late Samuel Beverley and Sarah Mills.
