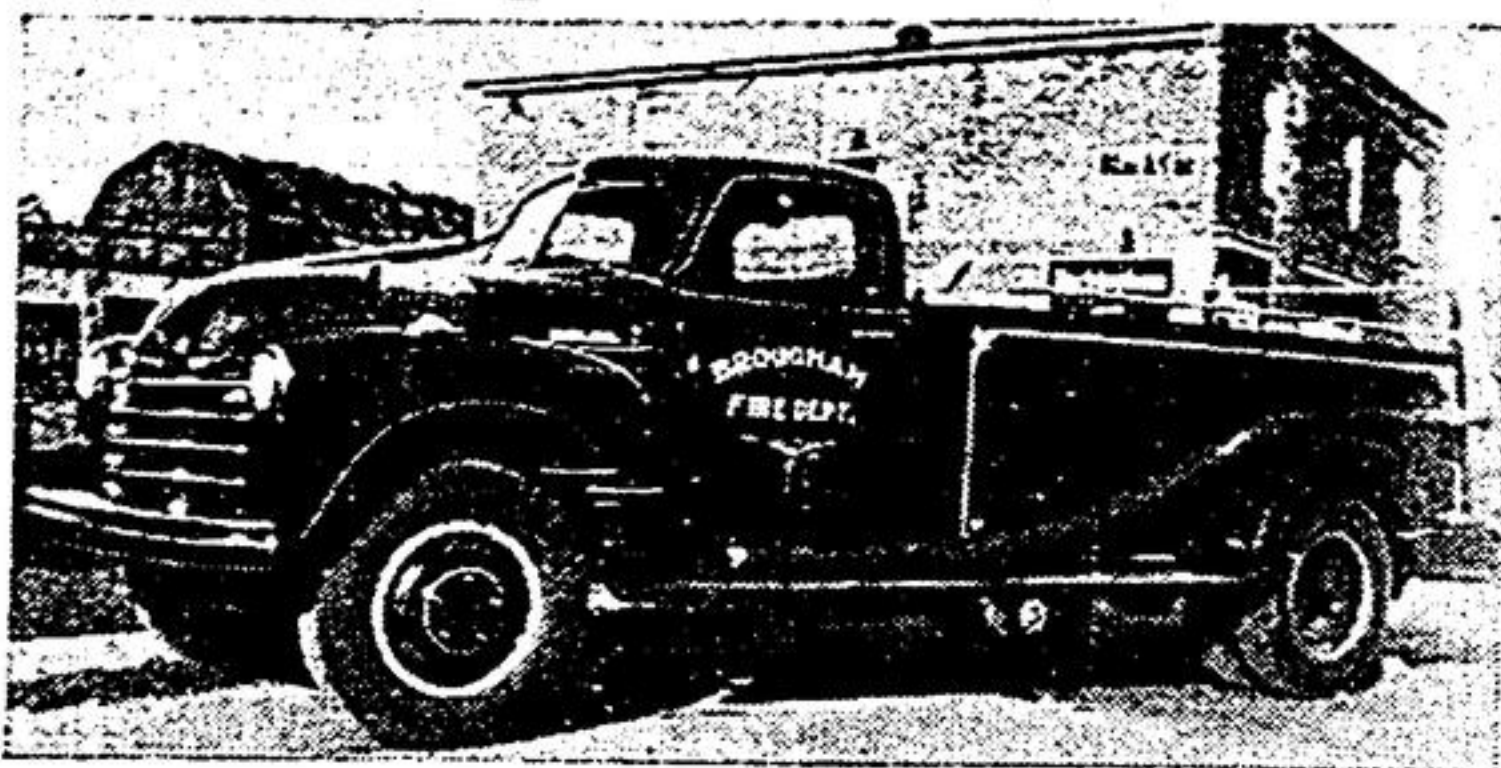

Water Pails for Sale Cheap in Brougham

After years of carrying water from several good wells in the village of Brougham, certain residents held a meeting last October and subscribed sufficient funds to install a pressure system whereby hard water could be forced into their homes.

Accordingly a well was dug at a given point after three devotees of the crutch stick fraternity had, each unknown to the others, agreed on the same place. All three agreed that a good spring could be found at a depth of 43 to 47 feet so that when the well digger hit the spring at 58 feet these Brougham people became staunch members of the Apple Tree Divining Association.

Considerable difficulty was encountered getting the lower bricks in the well because water came in at the rate of 500 gallons per hour. This however was finally accomplished after a number of attempts to keep the pump going steadily for 18 hours.

A two-horse power deep water electric pump was installed in the top of the well and in spite of difficulty in obtaining pipe a number of homes have running water on tap, and the Department of Health place the water Grade A.

Many were the jokes cracked about the gophers digging holes and trenches and the expected invasion, but when you can turn the tap instead of carrying the pail, the hard work is remembered as just so much fun.

If at the end of a year's trial, there is sufficient surplus water, it may be made available to more homes. On checking with the Registry Office, this community water system appears to be the only one of its kind in the County of Ontario to give year round service.

The parties behind this undertaking are to be congratulated on their initiative and if it continues to be successful we have no doubt, but that projects such as this will become common, especially as Brougham residents confidentially expect quite a real estate boom.
