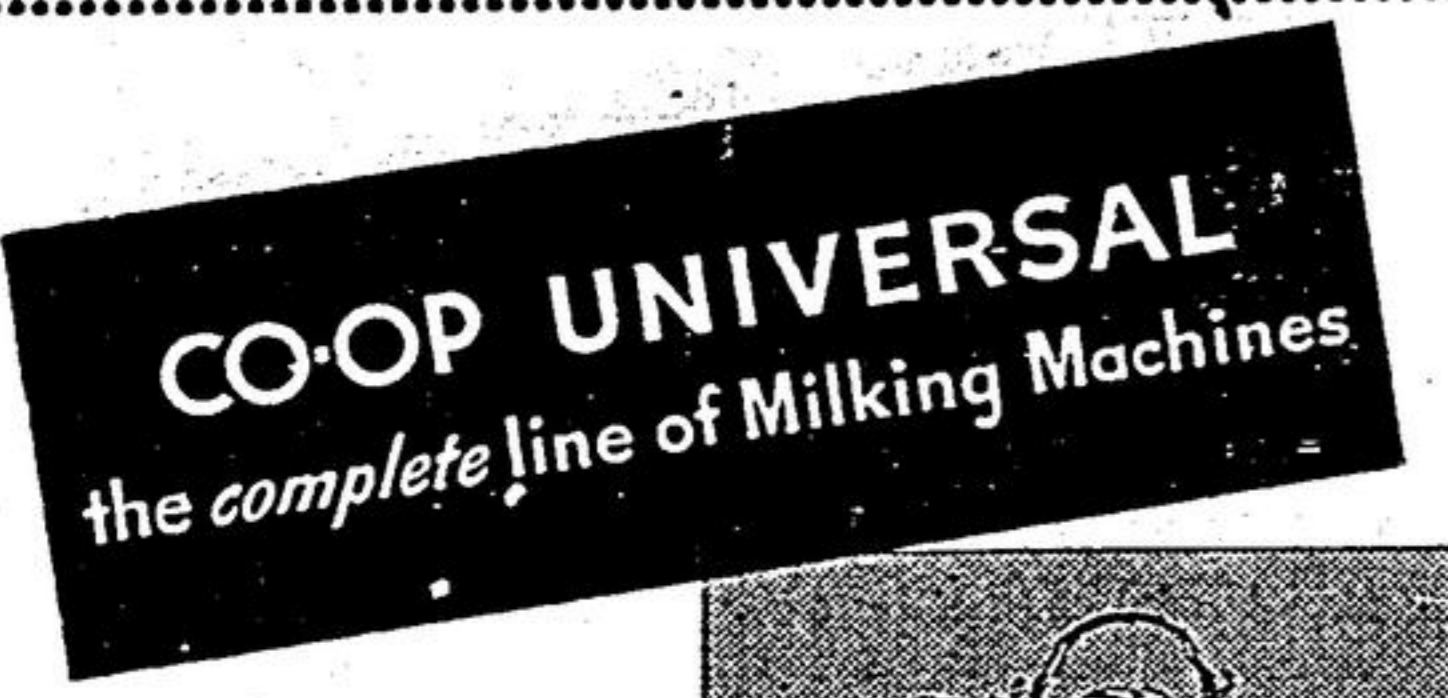

The weekly Young People's service was held at Mt. Joy on Sunday evening with the topic taken by Miss Irene Timbers.

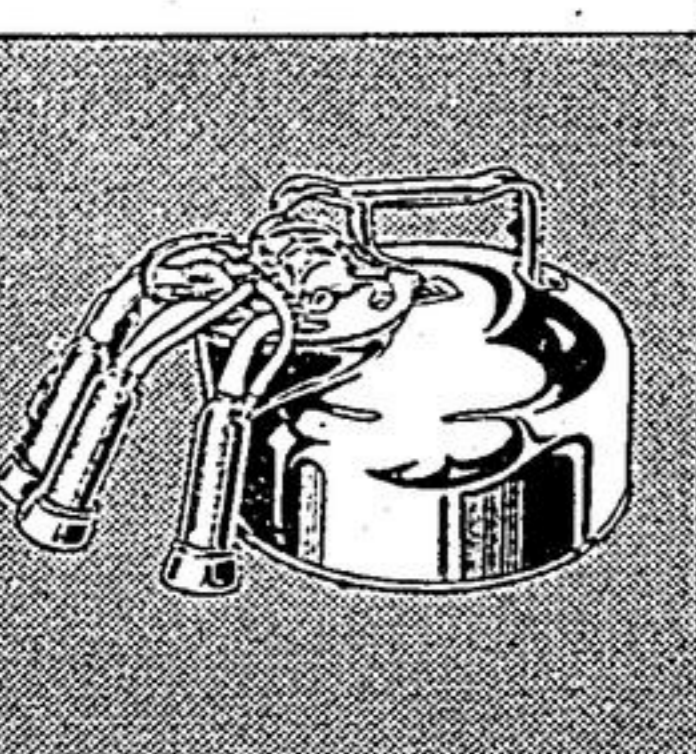

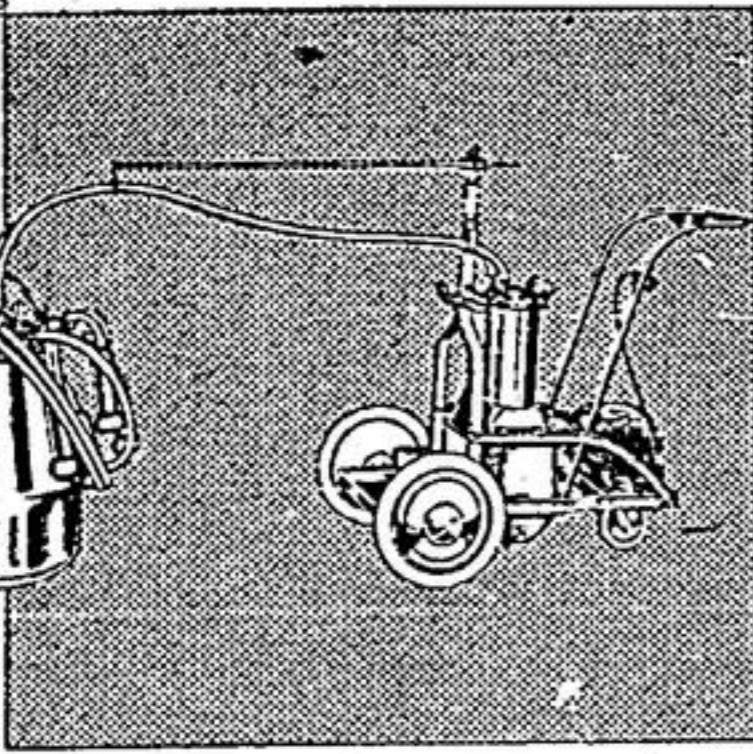
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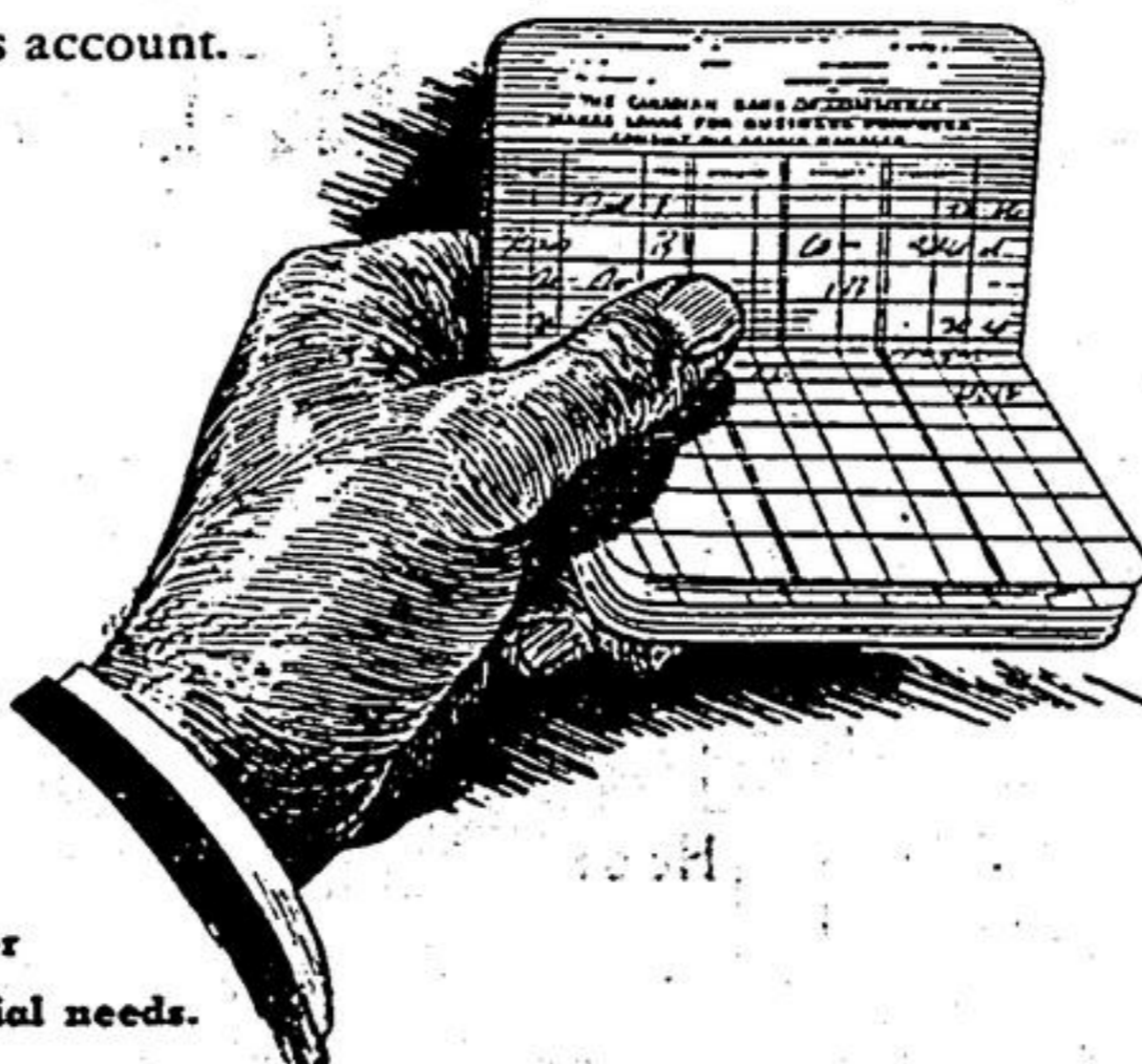
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
