It is suggested that the session may last throughout the week, then adjournment may be made when council will again convene within a week. This program is suggested in preference to holding the two weeks' session without a break.
 When the report of the Reformation Committee is presented early in the first week, it will recommend that York County forest at Vivian be designated a wild life preserve and bird sanctuary. If the recommendation of the committee is adopted by the council, the Dept. of Games and Fisheries will establish the preserve, and carry out the necessary functions to its operation.
 Chairman of Reformation, the Reeve of Stouffville, said he was presenting the plan to his committee this week, and from there it would go to the council for adoption or rejection.
