Township has New Weed-Cutting Scheme

Pickering Township will call for tenders for a tractor and mower shortly, which they will place in service next spring to cut roadside weeds. Roadside weeds which have always given trouble have been even more troublesome during and since the war, due to the shortage of help.

Farmers cannot be induced to cut them, and spraying has proved quite costly if any large area is to be covered. Pickering held a ton of spraying material this year which could not be placed on the weeds, owing to the fact that a spraying outfit was not available to do the job.

COUNTY VEGETABLE GROWERS SET 1948 MINIMUM PRICES

The annual meeting of the Ontario County Vegetable Growers' Association was held in the County Buildings, Whitby, recently with approximately 25 district growers in attendance. Several competent speakers were heard on the subjects, "production," "canning" and "disease."

Following the addresses a spirited discussion concerning canning crop prices and contract terms was held and the meeting went on record as favoring the following minimum prices for the ensuing year: Tomatoes, \$32.10 per ton; green peas, \$85.00 per ton; corn, \$29.50 per ton. In addition the association also recommended the fieldmen be appointed to supervise the marketing on canning crops.

The third and final recommendation to come out of the meeting was that no contract should be signed by farmers until such time as minimum prices are set by canning officials.

Correct addresses are available for most of those entitled to repayment, but a large number of taxpayers are constantly moving and others marry and their names change.

Cards on which to report changes of address or name are being sent to all householders in Canada. These are being distributed at the present time. Additional cards are available either at your district Income Tax office or your local Post Office. Do nothing if you live at the same address and have the same name as in 1942.
