**THIS KNOWLEDGE**  
Q.—How can I remove burnt stains from aluminum?  
A.—These stains on aluminum or other unsoldered utensils of brass, tin, or iron, can be removed by placing it while empty over the gas flame or fire until red hot.  
Q.—How can I bleach white goods?  
A.—By washing in the usual way and then soaking overnight in one-half gallon of clear water, to which is added two teaspoons cream of tartar.  
Q.—How can I remove blackheads from the face?  
A.—Use soap and water freely. Gently massage a thick lather on the face, and when it is dried, rinse off thoroughly. The larger blackheads can be pressed out with the fingers, using care not to bruise the skin. Then sponge the skin with witch hazel to avoid infection. This treatment should be used daily.  
Q.—How can I stiffen egg whites quickly?  
A.—When beating the white of eggs, break them into a plate that has been rinsed with cold water, but not dried. Add a pinch of salt. While whipping, stand by a window or open door.  
Q.—How can I remove bluing stains from linen?  
A.—These can be removed very readily with a little wood alcohol.  
Q.—How can I renovate the polishing mop?  
A.—Boil in soda water to which has been added two tablespoons of paraffin. Also add a few drops of paraffin in the last rinsing water and it will save labor when polishing.  
Q.—How can I remove rust from irons?  
A.—By putting some yellow beeswax or paraffin into a small cloth bag, and when the iron is warm, but not hot, rubbing it over this bag, then rubbing with salt.  
Q.—How can I clean silverware quickly?  
A.—If one has no time for cleaning the silverware piece by piece, place it in a dishpan of hot water and add a handful of borax and a little soap. Let stand in this solution for a few hours. Rinse in clear water. Dry with a soft cloth, and the task is done.  
Q.—How can I remove soot spots from a rug or carpet?  
A.—Cover it with dry salt, and work this around until it becomes soiled. Then sweep up the salt.  
Q.—How can I mix cornbread easily?  
A.—Have the mixing bowl warm before mixing.
