Good prices prevailed at the auction sale of Andrew Ashenhurst, north of Claremont, conducted by auctioneer A. S. Farmer on Thursday. The Massey-Harris tractor sold for \$1310 with a 2-furrow plow going for \$75. The hay loader brought \$192.50. Highest price cow in the sale brought \$167.50 with young cattle ranging in price from \$55 to \$90 each. Several tons of hay brought \$12 per ton. The grain sold well, with wheat realizing \$1.97 1/2 a bus. and mixed grain \$2.70 a cwt. A sow and pigs sold for \$67.50.
