Year's Budget \$216,000 The County Road Committee this year had a budget of \$216,000. At present there is approximately six thousand dollars remaining of this amount. A new road maintainer and a four-wheel drive truck costing approximately \$30,000 still have to be paid for.

In this year's budget provision was made for the erection of a garage to house road equipment, at a central point in the County and the purchase of the two pieces of road equipment mentioned above.

Members of Council are preparing a by-law to provide for a supplementary amount of \$25,000 for county road purposes.

During this session Ewart Marsdon, district engineer of the Department of Highways, voiced some criticism of the Ontario County Road Board for allowing such an expenditure.






