Jean Pabst Rag Apple, a member of the purebred Holstein herd of Charles O. Haines, Newmarket, Ontario, has just completed an exceptionally large Record of Performance test. Starting as a five-year-old, she produced in 365 days on three times-a-day milking, 27,339 lbs. milk containing 963 lbs. fat, average test 3.52 percent butterfat. This is one of the top records completed in Canada this year.

Not only is Jean a great producer but she is also a good individual as well, having been classed as "Very Good" in Selective Registration by the official inspector of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada. "Very Good" is the second highest classification for conformation in Selective Registration and only animals of exceptional merit are placed in it.

The annual meeting of the Ontario County Holstein Breeders Club was held in the Department of Agriculture Office, Uxbridge, on Saturday, December 13th, 1947.

Orvan Chambers, President of the club, was in charge of the meeting. Mr. Jim Brown, Newcastle, who is a Director of the National Holstein-Friesian Association, gave an interesting talk on affairs relating to the National Association. He stated that registrations of Holstein Cattle showed a decided increase over last year. Transfers, however, have shown a slight decline.

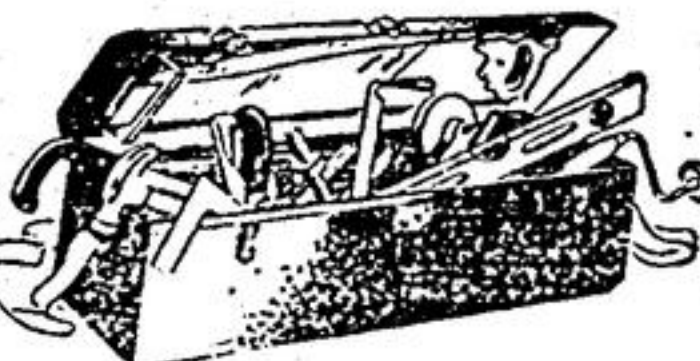
Mr. Joe Darlington, Todmorden, salesman for Ontario County Holstein Breeders' Club pointed out that the sales of Holstein cattle were the heaviest of any year yet and that the average prices received were also the highest. He said that a number of individual farmers from the United States were now coming to Canada to look over the Canadian herds and to select their own cattle.

Mr. Roy Ormiston, Brooklin, Fieldman for the Holstein-Friesian, reviewed the club activities for the year. He pointed out that Ontario County had 135 members for 1947 in the Holstein Club. This was the highest membership for any County in the Province of Ontario.
