The Ontario County "500 Bushel" Potato Club banquet was held in the Mansion House, Uxbridge, at noon on Wednesday.

Howard Harper, Goodwood, acted as chairman, and called upon Lloyd Lee, president of the Ontario County Crop Improvement Association. Garnet Rickard, Bowmanville, district director of the Provincial Crop Association, was also called upon and he stressed the need of working together towards a higher goal.

R. E. Goodin, potato fieldman for the Ontario Crop Improvement Association, presented trophies to the boys of the Scott Potato Club team, who won the inter-county judging competition at Guelph this fall, and they also stood second in the British Columbia team in the national club contests. This team was composed of Harry Harper, Goodwood, and Bob Meek, Sandford.

The guest speaker was Rev. L. E. Atkinson, of Trinity United Church, Uxbridge.

The representatives of various commercial firms said a few words and H. L. Fair, agricultural representative for Ontario County, presented the awards to the members of the club. The prize money was made up of donations from various commercial firms and from a grant of \$50 from the Crop Improvement Association. The total value of goods and cash amounted to \$178.70.

APPEAL COURT CUTS TERMS BANK THIEVES

Sentenced by Judge D. B. Coleman on September 8th last to terms of eight years for the armed robbery of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Pickering, Theodore Gregor and Frank Polanski have been successful in securing a reduction of two years in their sentences. Their appeals were heard before Justices Henderson, Laidlaw and Roach in the Court of Appeal in Toronto yesterday. C. L. Dubin acted for the appellants and C. P. Hope, K.C. for the Crown.

It will be recalled that the two young men entered the bank during the noon hour on August 13 and made their escape with \$14,213.53. Gregor was arrested in a Toronto house within five hours while Polanski was taken into custody at the Toronto Union Station before midnight the same day with a ticket for Winnipeg in his possession.
