WON'T SEPARATE SIAMESE TWINS JOINED AT HEAD

Indianapolis, Dec. 11.—Dr. Donald Casely, director of the Indiana University medical centre here, said today the Bedford Siamese twins are past the critical stage, and that no separation will be attempted unless one of the boys appears to be dying. The twins, 11-day-old sons of Mr. and Mrs. Edward R. Spear of Bedford, are joined together at the tops of their skulls by a bony structure three inches in diameter. Dr. Casely said X-ray pictures have shown that the babies' brains are connected, making any attempts at separation dangerous.

FARM SCHOOL AT NEWMARKET

Announcement has just been made by Agricultural Representative W. M. Cockburn that the annual four weeks' course in Agriculture will be held in Newmarket in January with the sessions being held in the spacious Board Room of the new Department of Agriculture office.

While basically the course will be somewhat along the lines of those held in recent years it is planned to have a number of outstanding farmer speakers and a few specialists throughout the month. Classes will be held Monday to Friday from 9.30 to 4.00. The course is intended for the North York district and now that the roads are kept open in winter about twenty-five—mostly young men—from Kettleby to Keswick, have already indicated their intentions to attend the practical discussions of farm problems and visits to stock farms.

THIS KNOWLEDGE

Q.—How can I keep bread from sticking to the pan?

A.—Heat the pan, then grease it and sprinkle dry meal in the bottom. The sample applies to cake, using flour instead of meal.

Q.—How can I remove rust from iron utensils?

A.—Rust can be removed from iron by applying kerosene with powdered bath brick to give it roughness.

Q.—How can I improve the flavor and texture of fudge?

A.—Both the flavor and texture will be improved if a small spoonful of cornstarch is added.

Q.—How can I remedy dry hair?

A.—A hot oil shampoo is good for dry hair. Heat pure olive oil and apply to the hair and scalp thoroughly at bedtime. Bind the hair with a towel to prevent staining the bed linen, and then next morning wash with a mild liquid shampoo. Use this treatment about once a week.

Q.—How can I prevent eggs from popping while frying?

A.—Sprinkle a tablespoon of flour, or a little cornstarch, into the hot grease and break the egg into it. It also adds flavor to the egg.

Q.—How can I keep cut flowers for several hours when no air is permitted to get to them?

A.—Wet the flowers thoroughly, cover with wet newspapers, and put in a damp place.

Q.—How can I protect playing cards from soil and wear, and make them slide easier?

A.—This can easily be accomplished if a thin coating of liquid wax is applied to each card, both face and back. It will also preserve their original stiffness.

FARMER FINED FOR CHEATING ON SEED

For selling buckwheat for seed which was below Grade 3 seed, a violation of the Seeds Act, Eugene Cloutier, R.R. Moose Creek, was recently found guilty in Police Court at Cornwall and fined \$10 and \$15 costs. The evidence disclosed that the buckwheat sold by Cloutier not only contained more than 5,000 weed seeds per pound, of which 800 per pound were common ragweed and 150 per pound wild mustard, and failed to germinate. The charge was laid by an inspector of the Plant Production Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture.

Mennonites on Move, 2000 Leave Canada

Gouldtown, Sask., Dec. 20—Twenty-three Mennonite families will leave this west central Saskatchewan district for a new life in a new continent, as soon as they can arrange transportation. Numbering approximately 90 persons, they will join more than 2,000 from Mennonite communities at Halbstadt and Altona, Man., in a migration that will carry them more than 6,000 miles to central Paraguay in South America.

Most of them belong to the Sommerfeldt sect, one of the four sects of the Mennonite church whose history has been marked by frequent migrations in search of religious freedom.

Some of the migrants came from Russia in the original Mennonite influx into Canada between 1870 and 1872, but most of them are children of the original settlers and were born in Mennonite communities scattered between Moose Jaw and Swift Current, Sask.

No definite reason for the migration has been given but such moves are not considered uncommon. Shortly before the war a group left the Swift Current area for Mexico. Most of the Gouldtown group already have disposed of their property and are ready to leave when transportation and passports are arranged.

In South America they plan to establish the same type of communal farming village they built in the west during the early days of settlement.

COURT FREES WOMAN WHO KIDNAPPED BABY

Doreen Curry, 21-year-old childless wife, promised in court that she never again will kidnap anyone else's baby. She greeted with happy smiles the news that a medical examination has shown there is no reason she can't have a child of her own.

The girl-like woman, who has been teased by friends and relatives for not having a baby after three years of marriage, acknowledged taking month-old Lois Hughes from her carriage outside a downtown store Oct. 9. Mrs. Curry exhibited the bay to friends here as her own and then took the child to her home in Havelock, where she was taken into custody two days later and brought back to Toronto.

Since her arrest Mrs. Curry has been under examination and treatment at the Psychiatric Hospital. During her court appearance yesterday, with no counsel representing her, she became nervous and tense. But as the case ended and she heard the magistrate's news as he placed her on probation, her face was wreathed in smiles.

"I want to thank the people of Toronto for letting me go free," said Mrs. Curry from the witness box, "and also the doctors who have helped me get along so well. It will never happen again."
