

"Only one Canadian housewife in nine follows the expert's advice on

"Take potatoes," said the statement. "The department's nutritionists found that in cooking this vegetable almost half the housewives questioned in the survey served their spuds boiled. The elusive vitamins and minerals went 10.30 a.m.-Worship. down the drain with the cooking water. A small percentage of this group cut the loss in food value by S.S. at 1.50 p.m. boiling potatoes in their jackets.

"About one-fifth of the 'boiled' whatever vitamin 'C' may have escaped the boiling process.

"Only four canny lasses out of a hundred followed the best possible 10.00 a.m.—Sunday School method of keeping all the food value in by baking their potatoes.

"Nutritionists who are good at figures-statistics, that is-claim that about half the vitamin 'C' in a potato is lost if it is peeled, boiled and then mashed, while the loss is 20 per cent. if it is just peeled and boiled. On the other hand, potatoes baked or cooked in their jackets in a little water in a tightly covered dish will keep almost all their vita-
