SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for February 1

Golden Text.—The Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost.—Luke 19: 10
Approach to the Lesson

It is blessed indeed to turn to the Word of God and trace out something of what the Holy Spirit has revealed concerning the person and work of our Lord Jesus Christ, for as our hearts are thus occupied we find ourselves stirred to greater love and increased adoration for the one who has thus wrought out the work of salvation for sinners who had no merit to plead and who must have been hopelessly lost, had it not been for God's grace manifested in the gift of His Son, who came to seek and to save those who could never, of themselves, find their way back to God.

That which was prophesied of Christ in the Old Testament was fulfilled, as recorded in the New Testament, when on Calvary He, the sinless one, took the place of guilty sinners and was made sin for us, "that we might be made the righteousness of God in him" (2 Cor. 5: 21). In His life of perfect obedience to the Father's will. He magnified the Law and made it honorable (Isa. 42: 21), and then, by bearing its penalty for all who would believe in Him, He has become the "end of the law for righteousness" (Rom. 10: 4), thus taking out of the way that which had otherwise spelled for us eternal condemnation (Col. 2: 14).

When an awakened soul realizes his lost condition and looks in faith to Him who loved us and gave Himself for us (Titus 2: 14), the Word assures him that his sins are all forgiven, and the believer stands now in a new relationship to God altogether, being justified from all things (Acts 13: 38, 39), and regenerated by the Word and Spirit of God (Titus 3: 5). Obedience then

becomes a delight, not as a ground of salvation, but because of gratitude to Him who has redeemed us to God by His own blood (1 Pet. 18, 19).

Verse by Verse

Isa. 53: 4.—"He hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows." The sufferings that the sinless Saviour endured were not an evidence that God was displeased with Him, but were the result of His entering into humanity in order to save a lost race. He became the "man of sorrows" that He might bring to us eternal joy and everlasting peace.

Verse 5.—"With his stripes we are healed." The Lord Jesus is here seen taking the sinner's place and enduring the judgment that sin had merited. He is the substitute for sinners. It was on the cross that "he was wounded for our transgressions" and "bruised for our iniquities." There the chastisement by which our peace is procured, fell on Him, so that now all who believe in Him are healed of the dire ravages that sin has made, and shall some day be presented faultless and every whit whole in the presence of His glory.

Verse 6.—"All have gone astray." The Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all." Notice that this verse begins and ends with the little, inclusive word all. Like sheep we have all gone astray and sought to fulfill our own willful desires. But Jehovah has laid on Jesus the iniquity of us all, so that now He can offer a full, free salvation to whosoever will. If we have not done so already, let us, in faith, go in at the first "all," confessing our sins, and come out at the last "all," rejoicing in our Saviour.

Matt. 1: 21.—"Thou shalt call his name JESUS," which means "Jehovah," the Saviour, because His mission to earth was to "save his people from their sins." He saves not only from the judgment due to sin, but He delivers also from the power of sin, as we look to Him in faith. Eventually He will free us from the very presence of sin, when we see Him as He is.

Chap. 5: 17.—"I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil." The Law and the prophets set forth a standard of righteousness which could not save because of man's inability to live up to the required commands, on account of his fallen nature. Christ did not come to abrogate these standards, but to impress upon men his sinfulness and to bear the penalty Himself that sin deserved. Thus He fulfilled all that was predicted of Him in both the Law (the books of Moses) and the prophets, the other inspired Books of the Old Testament.

Chap. 20: 26.—"Whosoever will be great among you, let him be your minister." In this the followers of the Lord Jesus Christ imitate their Master, who come not seeking honor from men, but to serve all by giving Himself for them.

Verse 27.—"Whosoever will be chief.... let him be your servant." This is in contrast to the great ones of earth, who ever seek for power and authority. See verse 25.

Verse 28.—"The Son of man came.... to give his life a ransom for many." It was for this very purpose that the eternal Son stooped in grace to become the Son of man by His holy incarnation. He came to redeem lost mankind by the sacrifice of His own holy life on the cross, in order that they who were utterly unable to deliver themselves from the thralldom and the judgment due to sin might be set free to enjoy the favor of God forever.

Heb. 4: 15.—"An high priest.... in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin," or more literally, apart from sin. Our Lord became like us in all things but sin. He took our nature, but not as defiled by sin. He was ever the sinless one; inwardly and outwardly. Nevertheless, His temptation was real. Satan sought to overcome Him on all points: the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eye, and the pride of life; but He proved Himself invulnerable on every count. Thus He was shown to be the suitable one to give Himself on behalf of others. The Law had no claim against Him at all, yet He bore its curse for us.

Verse 16.—"Let us therefore come boldly to the throne of grace." The sin question having been settled to God's satisfaction, Christ is now seated at the right hand of the majesty on high, and so the throne of righteousness becomes a throne of grace, to which all believers are invited to repair in order to obtain mercy when failure has come in, and to find all needed grace for every trying hour. He who died for us lives for us, and in Him we find every need met.

The Heart of the Lesson

Scripture reveals Christ Jesus as an all-sufficient Saviour. His perfect life on earth proved Him to be the unblemished Lamb of God, who could offer Himself on behalf of others since the Law had no claims against Him. On the cross He made full satisfaction for our sins and so became the author of eternal redemption for all who believe. Now in Heaven, He ever liveth as our great High Priest to make intercession on our behalf and to meet every need of our souls as we go through this scene.
