HOSPITAL COSTS FOR INDIGENTS MOUNTS

That public hospitals are a sink hold for public funds was again brought to mind when York County Council was told that indigent patients would cost double the sum paid the previous year. No matter how much money a public hospital receives, they run in the red, and little can be done about it. The man who pays has no control over management and while buildings are donated for hospitals the enormous cost for room space mounts just the same.

County Council was informed that the recent increase in the cost for care of indigent patients was authorized by amendments to the Public Hospitals Act at last session of the legislature.

As of January 1st, 1948, the cost per day will be increased from \$1.50 to \$2.25.

This will mean an overall increase in hospitalization costs of \$18,559, half of which is paid by York County Council.

It was pointed out that last year's budget for hospitalization was over-spent, mainly due to the increase in the number of T.B. after care cases. The cost to the county for T.B. after care for 1947 increased 100 per cent. over the cost for 1946.

The membership of the council has been increased by one member this year with the Township of Georgina having a population of 1,062, entitled to a second member. He is Deputy Reeve J. A. Foster. The council now consists of fifty-one members.

Council passed a resolution recommending a grant of \$1,500 be paid to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind.

Chairman for the respective committees are as follows: Agriculture, B. Weldrick; Education, N. G. S. Ingram; Finance and Equalization, J. Warren; Bylaws and Legislative, W. E. Brandon; Police, G. H. Mitchell; Market, H. G. Simpson; Reforestation, J. L. Spilleite.
