## Discuss School Area Setup with Stouffville

The question of an enlarged school area embracing the Claremont district with the newly proposed Stouffville-Markham area was discussed last week at a joint meeting of the Claremont Board and Stouffville Board of Education. The advantages of such an amalgamation to each was fully outlined and discussed in the most cordial manner. The Stouffville delegation revealed to the Claremont members that they were prepared to give immediate bus transportation to secondary school students in and around Claremont if the Claremont trustees and ratepayers desired it. The fact that such service could be commenced at the opening of the fall term this year was felt by the Claremont Board to be an advantage.

Whatever the wishes of the Claremont Board, they will be transmitted to Pickering Township Council, who in turn will pass their resolution on to Ontario County Council for ratification. Any changes in the present setup must be made at the June session of Council in order to become effective in 1949.

## BURY DR. J. MUSTARD WITH MASONIC RITES

A Masonic funeral for Dr. James Wright Mustard, 87, was conducted by Rev. M. Scott Fulton, of First Presbyterian church, Chatham. Dr. Mustard, former city analyst, had resided in Chatham since 1907. A native of Ashworth, in Scott Twp., near Uxbridge, he attended Uxbridge high school and graduated in arts from the University of Toronto in 1882 and received his degree in medicine four years later.

He served in the Riel rebellion in 1885 with the Red Cross Ambulance Corps. In 1887 he was appointed medical officer in Franklin, Mich. Later he practised at Harperfield, Ohio and in 1895 became assistant professor of medical chemistry at Wooster university, Cleveland. Dr. Mustard was a member of the Kent Historical society and his book, "Kentiana," contains much original information about the early history of the country.
