LET'S DEVELOP ST. LAWRENCE POWER
Recent shelving by the U.S. Senate of the St. Lawrence seaway project prompts the following editorial opinion in The Financial Post.

"We might as well face the fact that there exists a great deal of serious opposition not to mention honest doubt as to the practical merits of the scheme.

"In the meantime there is a great shortage of power on both sides of the St. Lawrence and if the industrial development in this area continues on anything like the recent scale, that shortage may easily become chronic.

"Whether or not the combined seaway and power project would ever prove profitable there is no question about the power. Here is a new source of 2.2 million horsepower (on the international stretch of the St. Lawrence) waiting to be developed. If we had it now a substantial block could be put to immediate and urgent use, and there should be little difficulty in finding new markets for the balance.

Co-op Says Now Is the Time to Buy Stock Feeds

How does the dramatic decline of coarse grains on the Winnipeg market and the slide in the United States commodity prices affect the Canadian picture?

It can bring near the return of free exporting of grain and livestock to the United States. It does raise some questions about the United Kingdom food contracts and their function as a floor to domestic consumer prices, particularly in meats.

Stouffville Co-ops, Mr. Clark says that as for meat prices the important factor to be remembered is that our contracts with the United Kingdom are the determining factor in our home prices.

At the same time further decreases in Canadian feed grain prices coupled with further reduction in livestock prices in the United States, must bring the question of grain and livestock exports to the United States to the point where the government may find it impossible to justify continuance of present embargoes. It is argued that the recent declines at Winnipeg would have been unnecessary had the government been willing to relax the prohibition on the export of oats and barley, for it now appears that there is some surplus of these grains over domestic requirements. That such a surplus could readily find a market abroad is indicated by the fact that mixed feed oats, under special permit from the Wheat Board, have recently been sold to Switzerland at approximately 80c. a bushel, plus an export equalization fee of 47c. to 48c. a bushel, making the price \$1.27 per bushel.

It would appear that with the possibility of the opening of an export market for coarse grains and proteins. The government authorized the export of 2,000 tons of British Columbia fishmeal on February 14) and with a floor price for oats of 65c. per bushel and 93c. per bushel for barley, f.o.b. Fort William, that feed prices might have hit their low for some time. Allowing for grade discount, oats on February 13th were only 75c. per bushel above the floor price on the Winnipeg grain exchange.

Taking all these things into consideration it would appear, says Mr. Clark that the present might be a good time for the farmer to look into their future feed and feed grain requirements.
