formerly of Sault Ste. Marie,  
Ont., has been appointed Cana-  
dian military attache to Yugos-  
lavia, it was announced from  
Ottawa by Hon. Brooke Claxton  
minister of national defence. He  
will have the acting rank of  
lieutenant-colonel. Lieut.-Col.  
Hogarth, 31, served in the sec-  
ond world war in the Royal  
Canadian Artillery. Following  
his return to Canada, he was ap-  
pointed to the Canadian Army  
Active Force. Lieut.-Col. Hog-  
arth was awarded the Distingui-  
shed Service Order for gallan-  
try and leadership in the north-  
west Europe campaign.

### STOPS TRAIN, LIFTS DRUNK FROM TRACK

Canada's railway companies are al-  
ways solicitous of the welfare of  
their patrons. But a C.N.R. engi-  
neer went even a step farther on Sa-  
turday when he stopped his train  
just east of Chatham, Ontario to re-  
move a sleeping citizen, who had  
pillowed his head in drunken slum-  
ber on the main rail.  
Police were notified of the inci-  
dent, but by the time they arrived  
the sleeper had departed in search  
of a safer and softer pillow.

### FARM TOOLS BURNED

Lindsay, Mar. 26—Fire complet-  
ely destroyed the driving shed and  
ruined a quantity of farm machi-  
nery when it razed the driving shed  
of Robert Jordan, Hogan's Island,  
R.R. No. 4, Lindsay.

According to sketchy reports, Mr.  
Jordan had his almost brand new  
tractor just half way out of the shed  
and while filling the tank he spilled  
some gas. Somehow the gas ignited  
and in seconds the building was a  
mass of flames. The flaming gas  
had dropped into some water on the  
driving shed floor and floated in un-  
der the equipment.

Neighbours in the district were  
summoned as quickly as possible by  
telephone but the shed was destroyed  
before any help could arrive. It  
is reported that the farm equipment  
is covered by insurance.

## Cannington Native Heads Freight Assoc.

Montreal, March 29—The appoint-  
ment of G. Fred Smith, assistant  
freight agent, Canadian National  
Railways, Toronto, to be chairman  
of the Canadian Freight Associa-  
tion was announced here today by  
the executive committee.  
Mr. Smith was born at Cannin-  
ton, Ont., and entered the Canadian  
National Railways freight depart-  
ment at Toronto in 1911. He became  
soliciting freight agent in 1915, and  
the following year enlisted in the  
C.E.F., serving in France with the  
Signal Corps. He returned to the  
railway in 1919, and progressed  
through various positions at Tor-  
onto and Montreal leading to his  
appointment in 1946 as assistant to  
the general freight traffic manager  
of the system. In April 1947 he was  
named assistant general freight  
agent for the Central Region with  
headquarters at Toronto.

### DUMPED DEAD HORSE INTO BEACH RIVER FINED \$25.

A 68-year-old Cameron mink farm  
owner pleaded guilty in court at  
Lindsay to dumping the carcass of a  
slaughtered horse into Beach River  
in Stanhope Township—an offense  
under the Public Health Act. The  
accused was convicted and paid a  
fine of \$25 and \$30 costs.

OPP Art Watson of Minden, stated  
that on March 6th he received a  
call informing him that the carcass  
of a horse was in the Beach River  
at the bridge. The officer said that  
he instructed Stanhope Township  
Reeve Ben Sawyer to have it re-  
moved.

Constable Watson testified that  
on March 15th accompanied with

went to the home of the accused at  
Cameron and he admitted the story.  
"The water from Beach River event-  
ually comes down to Minden," ex-  
plained the officer.

The accused explained that he pur-  
chased the horse at Hall's Lake and  
stripped the carcass there. He said  
it was the practise not to bring the  
bones back to his mink farm. On  
the way back to Cameron in his  
half-ton truck, the accused said, the  
carcass was dumped over the bridge  
at Beach River.

Said Corporal Taylor, "The P.H.A.  
takes a serious view of this—in  
Toronto restaurant owners are fined  
\$50 for having a few cockroaches a-  
round." Magistrate E.A. Gee stated  
that under the act one is liable to a  
\$100 fine.
