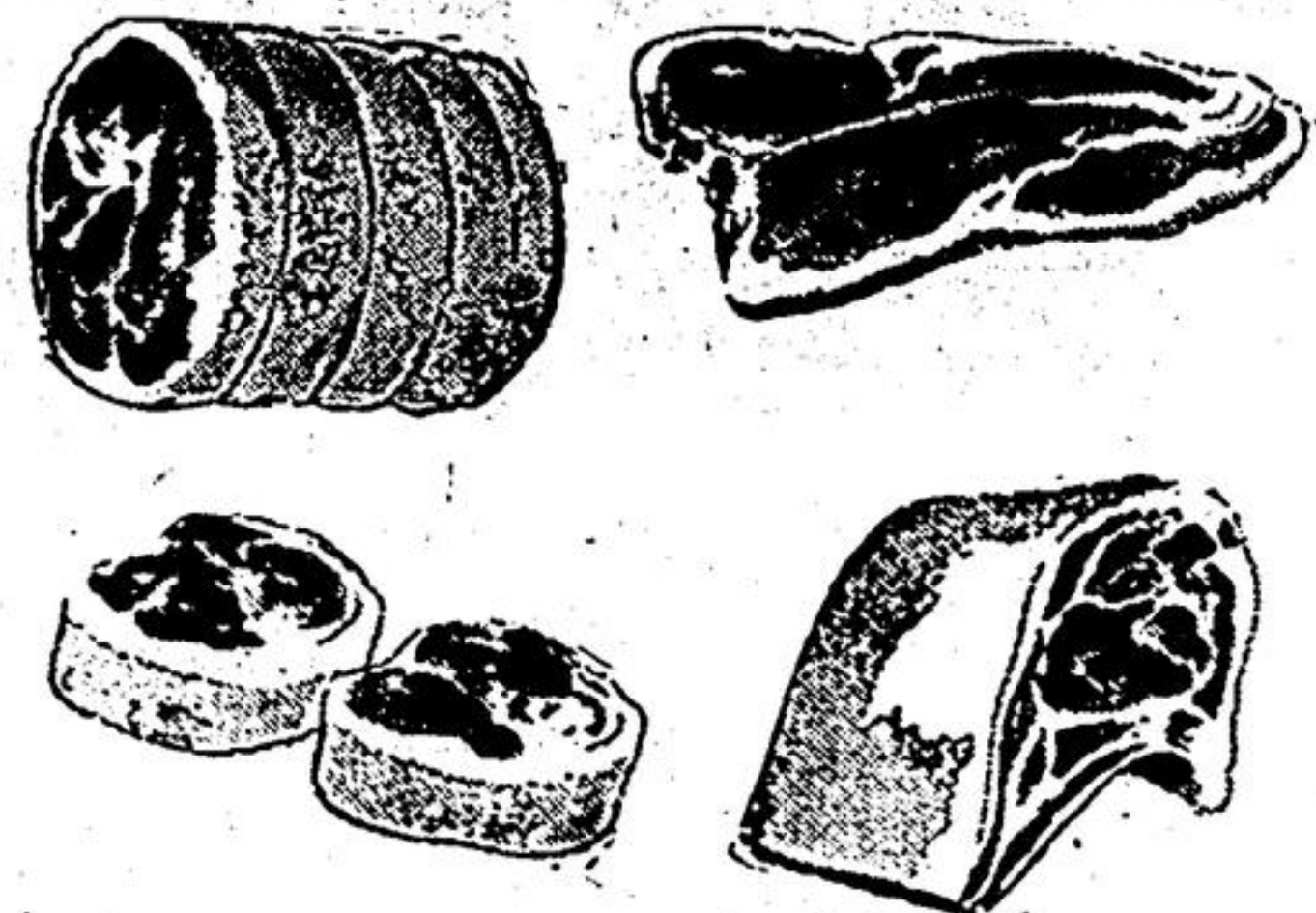

### Scarcity of Nails Still Hinders Building

Hardware and construction men in this district say the nail situation continues to be grim, and that the 1948 summer season promises to be a difficult one unless assurances from the producers are forthcoming.

Up to the present, there have been no assurances. To all appearances it looks like a season when contractors and carpenters will be beating a ceaseless tattoo on the door of the hardware merchant and wholesaler.

And most of the local spokesmen appear to regard cause of the nail shortage as more or less of a mystery. They have heard different reasons, one of the more prominent being that the source of raw material for manufacture of nails is limited.

"The situation hasn't improved a bit," says a dealer. He can't figure out where the nails are all going since manufacturers claim that more are being produced than ever before. All that anybody knows is that nails are hard to get. A Lemonville merchant offered a limited poundage to each customer with an order recently, and his supply was quickly snapped up. Stouffville hardware stores have been getting a good share of what is going as compared with other towns, but still nails are a scarce article.

### FEWER HORSES

Horses on farms as at December 1, 1947, numbered 1,979,400 being 12 per cent below the number for the corresponding date in 1946. Decreases occurred in all provinces. Saskatchewan had the most horses with 486,600, when the count was made last year by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ontario was next with 451,000, Alberta, third with 393,800 and Quebec fourth with 315,700. Since December 1, 1941, up to the corresponding date in 1947 there has been a decline of 907,000 horses on farms in Canada.
