Pickering Ratify Settlement For Ajax Social Services

Agreement Signed, Also Covers Payment for Services Until End of 1949.

Pickering Township Council, in regular session on Monday, signed an agreement with Central Mortgage & Housing, representing the Village of Ajax, by which the township will receive the sum of \$3,275.98 for social services rendered from 1942 until 1947. In addition the agreement provided that the township will receive \$1500 for social services per annum for the period of January 1948 until Dec. 31st, 1949.

At the expiration of that time, conditions as they exist then will be reviewed, although it was not expected that there would be much alteration. The payments will be made half-yearly.

This is the final settlement of negotiations which have been going on for several years, both with the township and the county, regarding payment for the Dominion housing establishment at Ajax during the war.

A request was received from the School Trustees of Pickering School Section No. 3 west, asking that they be empowered to issue debentures for \$46,000 to cover the cost of a two-room addition to the school. Council passed a bylaw covering the request for this amount.

The clerk was instructed to contact the local M.P.P., T. K. Creighton asking that the Dept. of Highways take over the cross links between Highway No. 2 and the new 4-lane highway.

The clerk was also asked to communicate with the department of Planning and Developing in connection with the proposed survey of the township, to ask if they could suggest the name of an engineer who might do this work.

Messrs. Ellis and Davies of Pickering complained to council regarding damages they allegedly sustained to their motor cars on the Pickering Beach Rd. The complainants were asked to submit their claims to council in writing at a later date.
