**Death of Daily Star Publisher Ends a Great Career**

Jos. E. Atkinson, president of the Toronto Daily Star Limited and Star Weekly, died Saturday at his home in the city at the age of 83 years. His death marks the end of a successful and useful life of one who was a champion of the less fortunate people.

Commencing his newspaper career in the office of a weekly paper he never lost his interest or fondness for the town weekly, and it was with this spirit that he donated to the C.N.W.A. in 1939, the handsome silver cup now reposing in the office of the Stouffville Tribune, which paper won the cup at that time, and which is still in Stouffville after annual competition among the weeklies in Ontario and Quebec provinces.

Beloved by his staff, and widely known for his philanthropies and for his phenomenal success in the newspaper world, he was one of the deans of daily newspaper publishing in Canada. Born near Newcastle, Ontario, on December 23, 1865, and brought up by a widowed mother, he began his newspaper career as a collector of accounts on the Port Hope Times at the age of 18. His whole subsequent life was devoted to journalism. From Port Hope, where he practically "ran" the Times, he moved to Toronto to take a position as reporter on the late W. F. Maclean's World, where he graduated to the editorial columns. He moved over to the Toronto Globe and became its Ottawa correspondent; went to Montreal as managing editor of the Herald; returned to Toronto to manage the Star at the close of the last century.
