Farmer Shakes Head And Fist Too

There is no relief for the small wage earner making as low as \$7.50 if unmarried, \$1500 if married, in the budget issued Tuesday night at Ottawa, despite the fact that members of parliament voted themselves \$2,000 per year tax exemption over the minimum. Farmers shook their heads and not a few shook a fist at the refusal of Finance Minister Abbott to give the low wage earner relief.

It is believed that if the exemptions had been raised to \$1500 for single people and \$2500 for married persons, several thousand less employees would be needed to handle tax forms throughout the Dominion, and most farmers would be certain to be tax free.

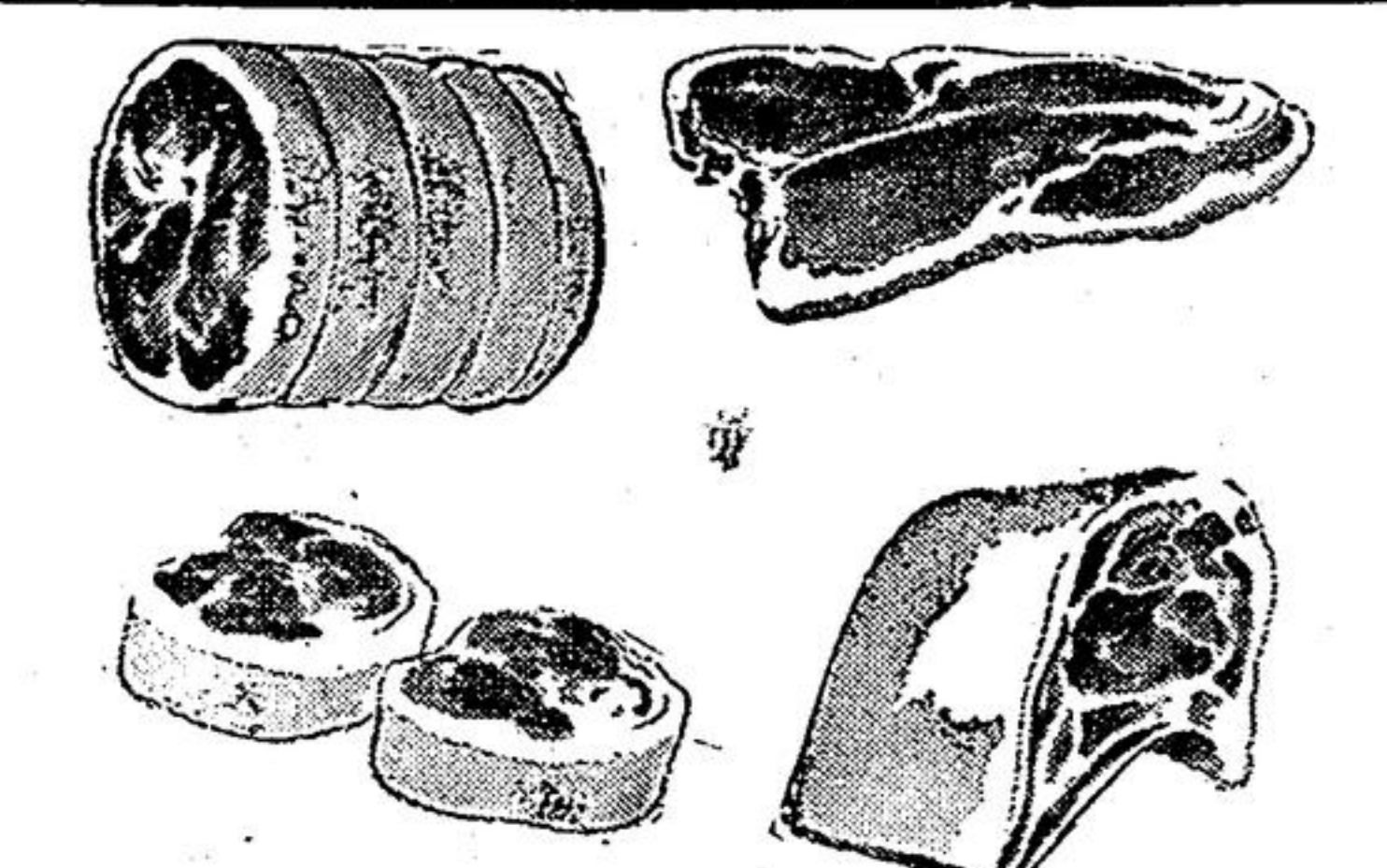
