Mennonites Form Mutual Benefit, Affects 3 Markham Churches'

M. R. Good of Kitchener has been elected president of the newly organized Mennonite Benefit Association, which has been granted a provincial charter. The association, to operate on a mutual basis, will provide Ontario, including qualified members in the Stouffville-Markham district, and Western New York, with coverage embracing hospitalization, surgery, disability, and death benefits.

At one time death benefits, styled life insurance, were taboo, but in recent years, this form of protection has not been so strongly opposed and members have taken out insurance in some form, particularly for fire protection. The new insurance could be the means of keeping members from seeking government aid in the form of old age pensions, which some churches in the union are hesitant to seek.

Particular emphasis is placed on the fact that this organization was not primarily effected for economic reasons but rather for the contribution it will make to the church's broader program of perpetuating its historic practice of mutual aid on Biblical principles.

Other officers for Ontario of the Mennonite Benefit Association are: Vice-president, Alvin Culp, Vineland; secretary Albert Honsberger, Waterloo; treasurer, David Jantz, Kitchener; executive member, Annanias Martin, St. Jacobs. Thirty directors appointed by the participating churches include Edward Fretz for the Markham Wideman church, John Grove (brother of Pastor Aaron Grove of Wideman) for the Almira church, and Harvey Burkholder for Cedar Grove church.

Local Clydesdales Sweep the Show

Clinton, June 4—Some of the classiest horse-flesh and dearest beef on the hoof was displayed here at the spring stock show of the Huron Central Agricultural Society, when Vinc Baker's Clydes won signal honors.

Love of watching a pretty driving or riding horse, or a stately and ponderous draft type, apparently still stays with the average farmer, whether or not he works his field with a tractor.

Dairy cattle were not prominent in the show, neither were hogs. Commercial bacon hogs on exhibit were sold in the pens for \$32 per 100 pounds.

The exhibition of Aberdeen Angus cattle was declared by livestock men to be outstanding in quality. Edwards Brothers of Watford took a silver-plated tray donated by the Robert Simpson Company for showing the champion beef herd, Aberdeen Angus.

Vincent Baker, Stouffville, made a wide sweep of prizes in the heavy horse class. His Clydesdales were named champion and reserve, respectively, of the heavy draft class. They took first prize in the four horse tandem hitch and took top money in their own class of agricultural horses. Besides, they were awarded a prize for the team coming the longest distance.

Judging the heavy teams were George Brown of Toronto and Wilfred Shaw of Dresden. W. H. Hunter of Orangeville judged beef cattle, and Thomas Devlin, Toronto, the market cattle. Leroy Brown, agricultural representative in Huron was in charge of swine judging.
