The next meeting of the Audley Community Club will be held; at the home of Card and Mrs. Winter on Monday evening, June 14th. At this time the yearly payments of the Blue Cross members are due. The committee have the new rates and the new benefits which are considerable. Old members who have no change in their status, will not need to siyn new cards. Others and new ones will be required to do so. The new rates effective after July are 75c. a month for ward and \$1.00 per month for semi-private. But this new rate gives 51 days of hospitalization for each member of the family under 18 years as well as to the husband and wife. It also provides x-rays up to \$25. And also serum and penicillin treatments up to \$25. This plan pays up to 50% of maternity cases after 10 months of membership. As several members of the club have been in hospital since they first entered, they know how much they have saved from this plan. The county cooperative plan is made along similar lines with about the same scale of rates.


