Retired Two Months Albert Diamond Dead

A well-known Pickering Township farmer for the past 25 years who just sold his 200 acres two months ago, Albert Cecil Diamond died in the Oshawa General Hospital on Friday, June 11. Mr. Diamond had been in failing health for the past two months but was confined to hospital only one week. A son of the late John Diamond and Elizabeth French, the deceased was born in Percy Township, Northumberland County. A farmer all his life he retired to Whitevale in March of this year. An active member of Pickering United Church, he held a number of church offices. He was also a member of the Independent Order of Foresters.

Predeceased by his wife, the former Estella Sykes, last New Year, Mr. Diamond is survived by two daughters, Mrs. G. Stevenson (Margery) of Brooklyn, and Mrs. Giles Tran (Ruth) of Green River, and four sons, Ray, of Toronto; Paul, of Seagrave; John, of Port Perry, and Bruce, of Whitevale. Also surviving are three brothers, Harry, of Palmerston; Charles, of Toronto; and Ernest, formerly of Grafton. Two sisters and a brother predeceased him.

Mr. Diamond was resting at the family residence at Whitevale where a short service was held at 2 p.m. on Monday, June 14th. Service was held in Erskine Church, Pickering, at 2.30 p.m., followed by interment in Erskine Cemetery. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Copeland, assisted by Rev. Mr. McLaughlin, of Whitevale.
