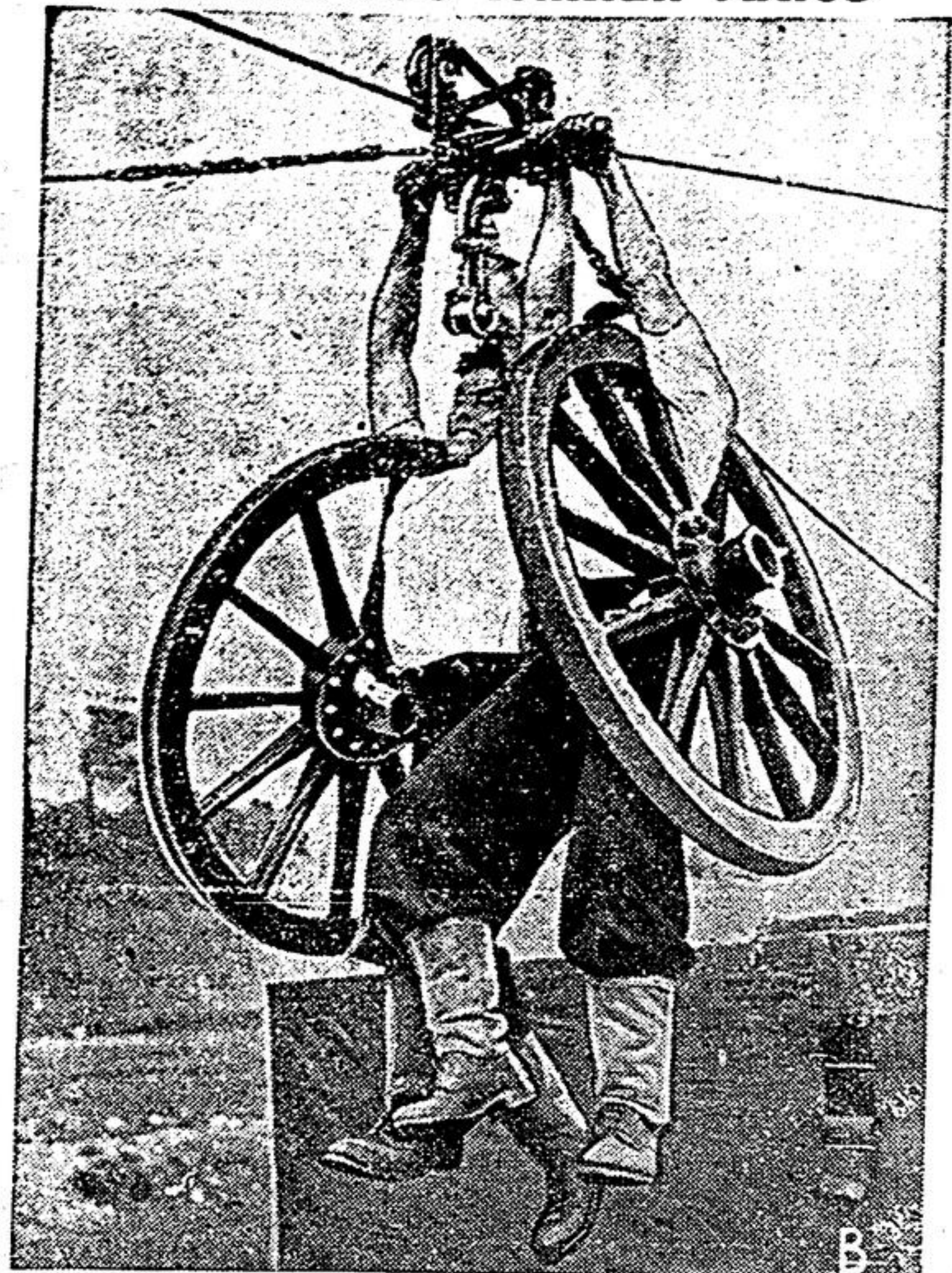


Sailors Are Human Axles

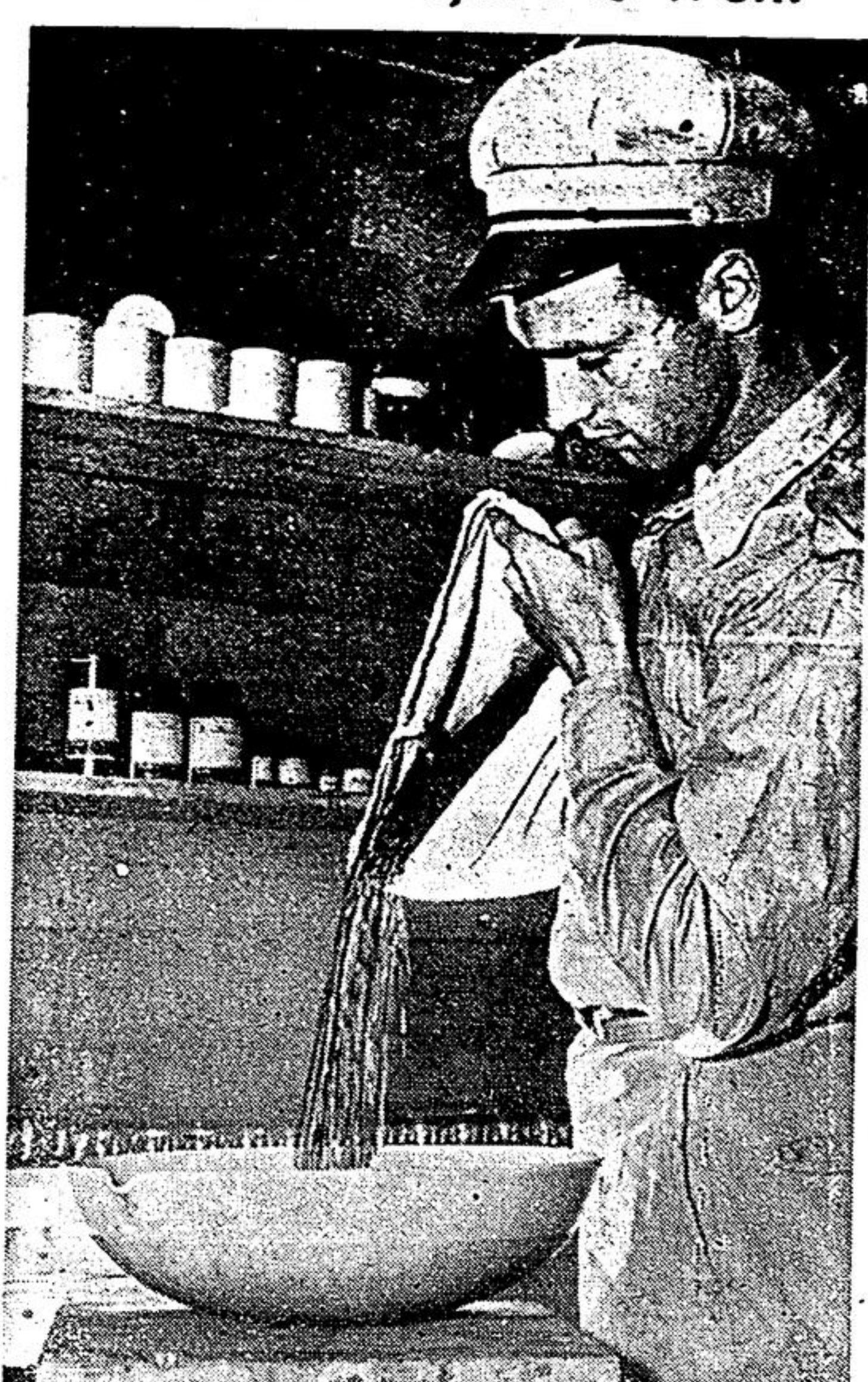

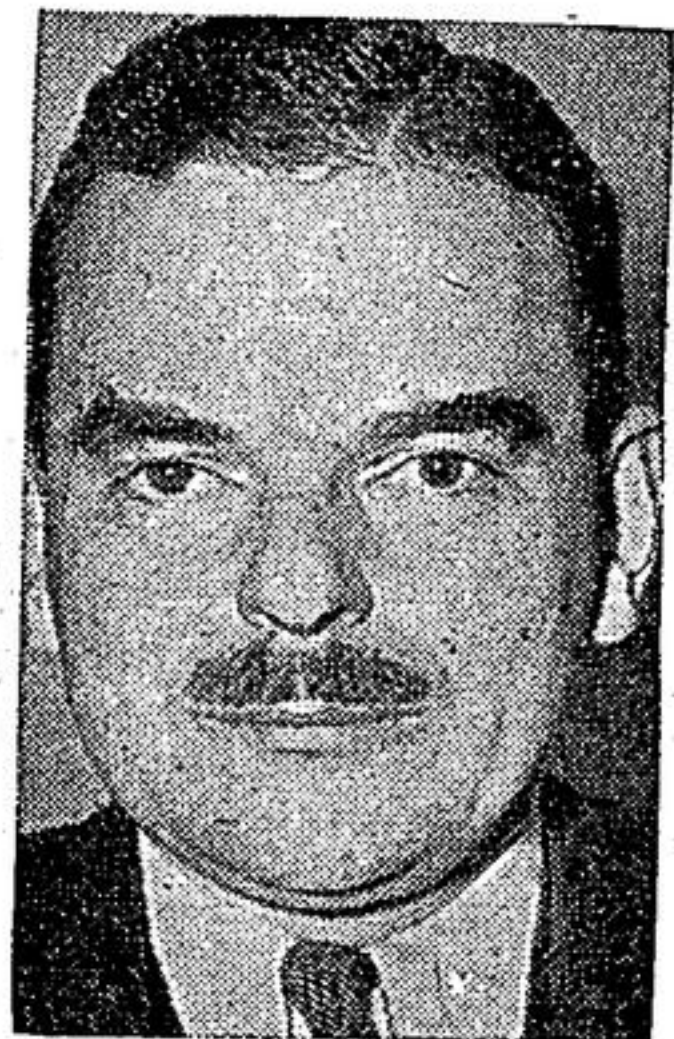

This summer he will be engaged by the Dept. of Forests and Mines and is shown here preparing seed for distribution over the burned forest areas of Northern Ontario. By way of experiment the seed will be broadcast from planes, after

treatment in the laboratories that will give the seed better than ever chance of survival. The seeds are smaller than marbles, and provide a much different method of planting than that used in the smaller areas such as Vivian where planting of seedlings is the adopted method, and which would be too slow, and quite impossible in the great forest areas in the north.
