Loose Smut in Wheat Worrying Farmers

"While most of the fields of winter wheat are very promising a great many farmers are disappointed with the amount of loose smut showing since it headed out," said Agricultural Representative W. M. Cockburn on Tuesday. The recent rains and winds have removed much of the blackened mass of smut but it will be easy to detect for a few days yet.

"This is the second year that Cornell 595 variety of winter wheat has been grown in York County," he explained, "and the almost total absence of loose smut is remarkable." Our agricultural representative is urging all farmers to check closely on their wheat fields right away and look up fields where suitable seed might be obtained. Names of most of the growers of Cornell 595 have been listed at the Agricultural Office of Newmarket and lists will be mailed to anyone on request.

In order to secure as wide a distribution as possible of this smut resistance anyone having wheat of this variety should advise the Department of Agriculture, Newmarket right away. There are thirty-three contestants in the 50 Bushel Wheat Club and most of these are growing Cornell this year, according to Mr. Cockburn. Last year with the exception of thirteen the twenty highest yielding fields were Cornell.

This wheat seems to be the present answer to our smut problem and whereas it is not quite as pure as to variety, its straw strength is comparable to Dawson's and its higher yields and smut resistance it far ahead, the representative declares.

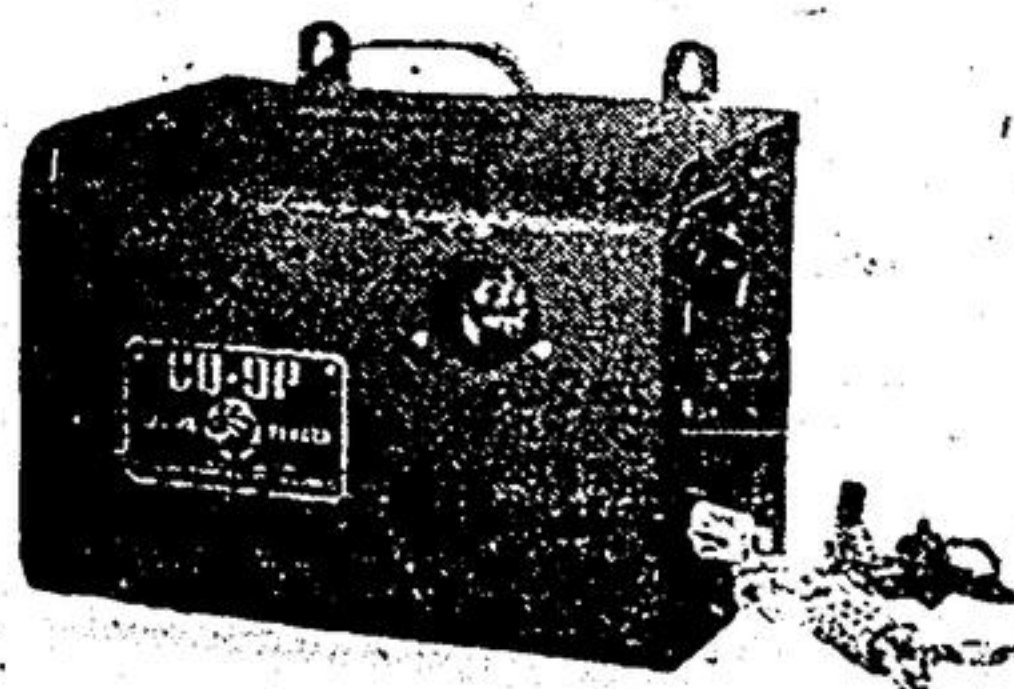
