Whitby to Pool School Resources With Township

Year-long discussions about the formation of a new high school district in the immediate vicinity of Whitby are believed to be at an end following a meeting last week of the Whitby Board of Education, the Whitby Town Council, Whitby Township Council, and the Board of Brooklin Continuation School together with Gordon Duffin and Charles Booth of the Department of Education.

A new school area will include Whitby and Whitby Township and the County Council is expected to pass a by-law to that effect next week. If and when another high school is built, the present Whitby High School will revert to the Whitby Public School Board.

Without the inclusion of Pickering Township in the area (it is forming its own area) the meeting could see little material advantage and some possible losses, in formation of the small area, but after long consideration Harry Jermyn, of Whitby, summed up by saying that neither Whitby nor the township is hazardous anything and there are future possibilities in extending the bond between the two municipalities. At first Duncan McIntyre was inclined to take the view "not so fast" but finally agreed that in view of the long history of the case and the necessity of making a decision before County Council meets this week, that Whitby should agree to the area.

Mayor William Dabidson opened the meeting and called upon F. J. McIntyre of the Board of Education to be chairman.

Fewer Courses?
Many facts and figures were heard to illuminate the situation. The Department of Education recommended the union as the only logical step to take, though it may not result in immediate financial benefits or extension of school courses due to the limited number of pupils in the area, (school attendance will be about the same as at present until the local population increases).

At first the deputy reeve of Whitby demurred: "I was sold on the idea of the large area but now Pickering has pulled out, I can't see where we stand to gain. It would have been to the advantage of Pickering to come in with us."
Other speakers were Inspector A. A. Archibald; clerk of the county, William Manning; the departmental representatives, Heber Down and Reeve Anderson of Brooklin. Others asked questions. There was no definite information brought forth on whether the local high school program (curriculum) would have to be curtailed when and if fewer students attend after a school is built in Pickering Township, but it was believed there would be counteracting factors.

How Board Composed
The situation is that Whitby High School is badly overcrowded while Brooklin Continuation School has not enough and has been considered by some of the Township Council as a "white elephant."
Representation on the new high school board will be eight members, three from the town, two from the township, public and separate school boards appoint one each and the county appoints one.

"We must consider that if we don't take this step we will be becoming 'educational orphans' in this county," said John Hare, referring to the fact that other sections have already settled their school area boundaries.
By the close of the meeting the entire large and representative gathering had agreed to collaborate on the area. Transportation will ultimately be provided for pupils from their homes to their district school.
