### Plane Frightens Uxbridge Farm Team

A hedge-hopping jet aircraft stampeded a team of horses on a farm two miles south of Uxbridge on Wednesday. Hilliard Armstrong, driver of the horses, said more than \$200 damage was done to his mower, fences and gate.

"I was mowing my neighbor's field and had just got down to adjust the mower when the aircraft came over," he said. "I flattened out on the ground where I stood. It came over about 50 feet above the trees. It made a screaming noise which would scare anything. The horses ran for home, crashed through two fences, ran a quarter of a mile down the road and tried to turn into my lane. They missed the turn and took out a gatepost and ended up straddling the hydro pole.

"Lots of people heard the aircraft, but no one seems to have really got a good look at it. It was flying so low and fast you didn't have time to look up. One of the neighbors heard it coming, thought it was going to take the chimney off."

Armstrong said his horses were scratched up "badly" and are too stiff to work. He said the mower now was only good for scrap. Neighbors, he said, have offered horses and equipment to enable him to continue work.

### ACCUSED IS FREED IN \$4,000 THEFT

Michael Nolan, 27, of Sutton, accused of theft of \$4,722 worth of bonds and securities, was last week acquitted under Judge M. A. Miller by a jury in General Sessions court at Whitby.

The bonds were alleged to have been stolen from Mark Smith of Uxora last June. He had buried the bonds in a syrup pail when he was unable to rent a safety deposit box. He claimed that Nolan knew the location of the cache. The bonds consisted of \$2,500 Victory Bonds, \$1,000 Dominion of Canada Savings Bonds, two \$50 bearer bonds, war savings certificates and other securities.

The Crown alleged that Nolan sold them to Miss Ella Prange and Wilfrid Cunningham, both of Toronto.

Although Crown witness Miss Prange had testified that the stolen bond which she cashed had been given to her by Nolan in a poker game, both Nolan and his 21-year-old wife told the court that Nolan did not play cards and did not know poker. Mrs. Nolan said her husband had been home at the time of the alleged theft.

The jury deliberated only 30 minutes. Defence counsel was R. D. Humphreys, K.C., and A. C. Hall acted for the Crown.
