## Ready for Gangs, Says Reeve, But Weekend was Quiet

The Beanery gang—or any other gang—will get a short, sharp welcome if it attempts to create further disturbances at Wilcox Lake or Musselman's Lake. Lorne Evans, reeve of Whitchurch Township, briefly outlined steps the township council has taken to preserve the peace at the two lakes, following Saturday's meeting of the council.

Two township officers have been stationed at each lake, said Mr. Evans. In addition, arrangements have been made for prompt reinforcement from county police stationed in adjoining areas, and the Ontario Provincial Police at Aurora have promised assistance.

Reeve Evans was insistent that the township police officers, headed by Chief Ronald Watts of Newmarket, were determined to stamp out rowdiness at public resorts. And, the reeve added, he was confident the township officers were quite capable of carrying out their determination.

At Sutton, tension which had run high over the two preceding weekends was relaxed. Youths of the district had gathered at a popular dance hall, The Lighthouse, expecting trouble on the Saturday night when disturbances developed at the Whitchurch Township lakes. The boys, in their late teens and early twenties, were expecting the Beanery gang to make an appearance and, probably to interrupt the dancing. The Sutton and Jackson's Point youngsters were determined to resent any interference with their Saturday night enjoyment.

Saturday night, following the prompt police action, which stopped demonstrations at the two lakes, there was no expectation of trouble, and none developed.

## Rev. P. L. Jull of Brooklin Dead

Minister of Brooklin United Church for 22 years prior to his retirement in April of last year, Rev. P. L. Jull died at his home in Brooklin on Friday. Partially paralyzed since giving up his pastoral work, he had been out of doors in a wheel chair and enjoyed conversing with friends. His death came quite unexpected, his wife being away from home for a short rest at the time of his death.

In his 69th year, Mr. Jull was a son of the late Henry Jull and Elizabeth Fairfield of Norfolk. Rev. Mr. Jull was a strong contender for the Stouffville pastorate, at the time Rev. D. Davis was called to the pastorate here six years ago.
