stated deputy-reeve Dr. McEwen. "Would you suggest that we look into having the Provincial police do the work?" asked Reeve Westney.

"I'm told they don't do as good a job as we're getting now," replied Councillor Balsdon.

"I've been hearing these bad reports about the police for two years," said Councillor Frank Disney. "It's time we found out what they're doing."

"We've had two drunken brawls in Pickering in the last two weeks, and nobody, even bothered to call the police," stated deputy-reeve McEwen.

Following this discussion the clerk was instructed to contact the police and have them come before the council. After questioning by council, it was agreed that the constables, John Irvine and Fred White, should submit monthly reports of their work along with time sheet and mileage account.

A bylaw authorizing the issuing of hunting licenses was given two readings by council and will be submitted to the Game & Fisheries Dept. for approval.

Mr. Ravey of Rouge Hill Dr. waited on council with a view to finding out their intentions regarding the taking over of service and bypass roads in the lake front area caused by the new 4-lane highway going through. Mr. Ravey is a real estate man and large land owner in the Rouge district.

At the time the new highway was cut through, a number of township roads were closed off, and alternate roads opened and paved by the Highway Department. The question now arises as to whether or not the township should assume these bypass roads.

"We shouldn't have anything to do with any bypass roads," said deputy-reeve McEwen, chairman of the road dept.

It was revealed that Pickering has already asked the Highway Dept. to assume the most travelled bypass roads between the old No. 2 highway and the new 2A highway.

It was finally agreed that the council should meet with Highway Dept. engineers to look over the situation.

Uxbridge Twp. Council In Evening Session

The Uxbridge Township Council held its July 13th, all members being present.

In the communications read to the meeting was a letter from J. W. Walker offering to purchase trees growing on sideroad adjoining his property, also a letter from John Cleary regarding a line fence, and from Mrs. Helen Smith, complaining about the dust on the road in front of her property.

No action was taken regarding Mr. Walker's offer. The Clerk was instructed to provide Mr. Cleary with the necessary forms to call in fence viewers, and the road superintendent will furnish Mrs. Smith with sufficient dust layer to cover the road fronting her property.

The treasurer presented his half-yearly report, showing receipts of \$11,764.76, and disbursements amounting to \$11,194.98.

Road account for June amounted to \$2,109.83 and was passed for payment. General accounts amounting to \$317.80 were also authorized to be paid.

The next meeting will be held in the evening of August 9th.
