Horse Show and Fair Three Days at Sutton

Central Ontario's big midsummer event, the Sutton Horse Show and Fair, comes along this next weekend, just after people recover from the Civic Holiday weekend. Sutton Horse Show this year is Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 5th, 6th, 7th. A great many people who visited the Show last year were disappointed because of

the jamming crowds on the Saturday, so determined to visit Sutton Exhibits of Children's Work, Home Department, Flowers, Vegetables etc., are judged Thursday noon and on display through to closing time on Saturday evening. Friday is the opening of the Horse Show proper, in the big centre ring in front of grandstand, where the hunter and jumper horses perform their ever-thrilling leaps. There is no steeplechase this

year, but the Horse Show Division is staging a "miniature fox-hunt" with mounted huntsmen in "pinks" and hounds following a trail laid from the big ring, out over a series of fences and water jumps, even to a 12 foot hurdle of upended stumps. There are 12 classes for jumpers on Friday and 12 more at the Saturday Show; when the hounds will follow the "fox-trail". Harness horse fans get their innings on Friday afternoon and again on Saturday afternoon when some of the outstanding trotters vie for the \$100 per race purses. Friday sees the 228 class and the 218 class; on Saturday it is the 224 class and Free-for-all. Three heats to each race.

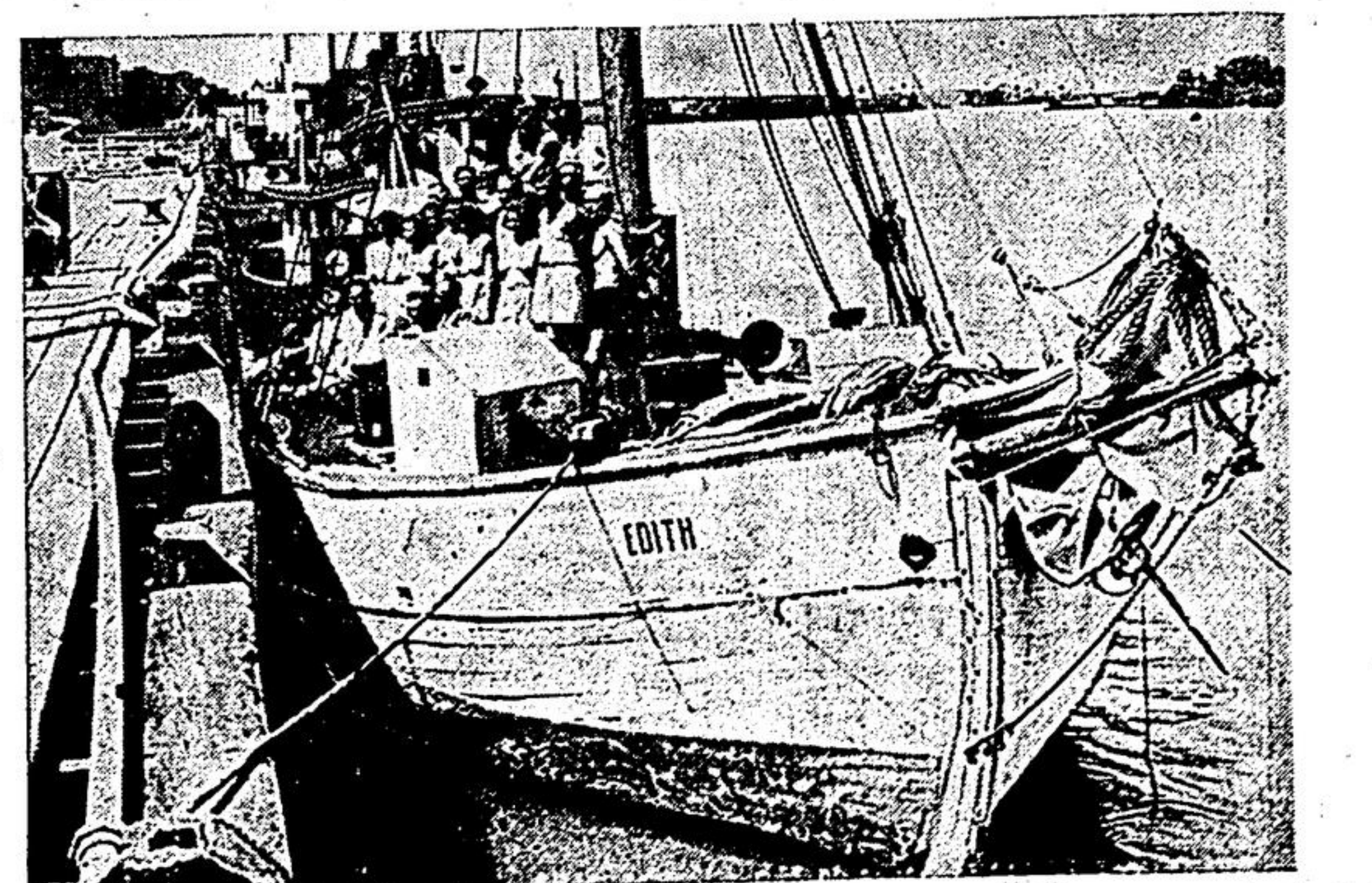

After a 75-day voyage across the Atlantic in a 43-ft. sailboat 23 Estonians reached Savannah, Georgia last September. They were fleeing the Russian "terror" but they were refused sanctuary in the U.S. They found home and freedom in Canada

which brushed aside red tape and allowed them to settle in Kitchener, mostly in Mennonite and Lutheran homes. They've become such good Canadians that officials who sponsored the move would like to see the same thing happen in the case

of the 29 Latvians who landed at Plymouth Rock, near Provincetown, Mass., and are now in Boston immigration sheds. In this boat the 23 crossed the stormy Atlantic and reached U.S. last fall.
