## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Golden Text—As we have there-  
fore opportunity, let us do good  
unto all men. —Gal. 6:10

### The Lesson as a Whole

**Approach to the Lesson**  
One of the greatest mistakes that  
people often make, who belong to  
minority groups because of race,  
religion, or some other peculiarity,  
is that they must insist on what  
they think of as their rights in or-  
der to be cordially recognized by  
those of the majority party. If, in-  
stead of giving way to sensitiveness  
and becoming offended when their  
claims are ignored, they would  
seek to be of service to others,  
they would soon be surprised to  
find how differently they are  
looked upon. In Ebed-melech we  
see a man of Ethiopia, whose name  
will be held in everlasting remem-  
brance, both by God and man, be-  
cause of the consideration he show-  
ed to the Prophet Jeremiah in his  
time of great need and distress.

Ebed-melech might have reason-  
ed that inasmuch as he and Jerem-  
iah were men of different races  
and cultural standards, he, there-  
fore, had no responsibility toward  
the prophet of Jehovah, who was  
being treated so badly by men of  
his own race and nation. But in-  
stead of this, the kindly Ethiopian  
saw in Jeremiah a brother-man in  
affliction who needed a friend, and  
he determined to do the part of a  
friend toward him. It is evident  
that this colored man had come to  
know the true and living God and  
so was of the same spiritual fam-  
ily as Jeremiah despite the differ-  
ence in the color of their skins.  
God took note of his kindly con-  
cern and saw to it that his name  
was recorded in Holy Scripture as  
an example for others to follow in  
after days.

**The Historical Setting**  
We are not certain of the name  
of this Ethiopian. Ebed-melech  
means "servant of the king" and  
may simply designate him as a  
bondman in the household of Ze-  
dekiah, king of Judah. It was the  
cognomen by which he was known  
at that time and by which we  
know him today. We have no re-  
cord of his life apart from what  
is told us in chapters 38 and 39  
of this Book of Jeremiah. When  
no one else came to assist the  
prophet, who had been cast into  
a filthy pit because of his faithfulness  
in giving out the word of the  
Lord, Ebed-melech appeared and  
gave him the help he needed.

**Verse 12.**—"Put now these old  
cast cloths and rotten rags under  
thine armholes under the cords."  
Thus cushioned, the cords would  
not cut into the flesh and injure  
Jeremiah as the men sought to  
draw him up from the pit. The  
grateful prophet recognized the  
wisdom of this, and did as he was  
commanded.  
**Verse 13.**—"So they drew up  
Jeremiah.....and took him up  
out of the dungeon." The plan  
worked well, and Jeremiah was  
lifted out of the filth and mire  
into which he had been cast and  
where his enemies hoped he  
would die. As he was a prisoner  
still, he remained in the court of  
the prison until such time as the  
king might see fit to free him.  
**Chap. 39:15.**—"The word of the  
Lord came unto Jeremiah, while  
he was shut up in the court of  
the prison." Prison walls could  
not shut God out. He was with  
His servant in his sufferings, and  
now He came to him with a special  
message for the colored man  
who had been so considerate of  
him. One is reminded of George  
Muller's words to J. Hudson Tay-  
lor, in view of possible imprison-  
ment in China for Christ's sake.  
He said, "Remember, they may  
wall you round, but they cannot  
roof you in."

**Verse 16.**—"Speak to Ebed-me-  
lech.....saying, Thus saith the  
Lord of hosts, the God of Israel;  
Behold, I will bring my words up  
on this city for evil, and not for  
good." The day was near when the  
predicted destruction of Jerusalem  
and the captivity of Judah would  
be carried out. God could not tol-  
erate forever the corruption and  
wickedness into which His people  
had fallen.  
**Verse 17.**—"I will deliver thee  
in that day, saith the Lord." He  
who had long ago declared, "Them  
that honour me I will honour,"  
had taken note of Ebed-melech's  
kindness to His servant; and He  
would reward him accordingly by  
preserving his life and saving him  
from going into the Babylonian  
Captivity.

**Verse 18.**—"Thy life shall be for  
a prey unto thee, because thou  
hast put thy trust in me, saith the  
Lord." Here we have the secret  
reason for Ebed-melech's consider-  
ation for Jeremiah. He trusted in  
Jehovah and was therefore among  
those justified by faith, and his  
good works were the outcome of  
the faith that was in his heart.  
"The Heart of the Lesson."  
Jeremiah suffered, not for his  
sins, but because of his faithfulness  
to God. In his hour of need  
a friend was raised up of whom  
we might never have heard ex-  
cept for this incident. Ebed-melech,  
a colored servant in the king's  
house, knew the God of Israel,  
and, moved by His love, he under-  
took to deliver Jeremiah from the  
pit into which he was cast. His  
love was a faith that worked by

## CHANGE RULES FOR PUBLIC SPEAKING

Some important changes have  
been made in the regulations for  
the annual Public Speaking Com-  
petition sponsored by the Junior  
Farmers Association for Ontario  
for 1948-1949. This competition,  
for which the elimination contests  
will soon be under way, provides  
for local club, county, district and  
zone elimination contests from  
which will come five zone winners  
to take part in the final competition  
in Toronto next January at the  
time of the annual meeting of the  
Ontario Federation of Agriculture.  
The most important change is  
that in the final competition the  
five contestants, in addition to de-  
livering a prepared address of ten  
minutes duration, will also be re-  
quired to make a three minute im-  
promptu speech on a general sub-  
ject supplied by the Junior Farmer
