Intermediates Shine In Defeat Against Toronto Earls court

Sensational Fielding by Outfielder Murray Holden, Features Tight Contest—Schell Gives Up Only Three Hits in Six Innings

Despite a 5-1 loss to Toronto Earls court Seniors on Wednesday night, Stouffville Intermediates dished up some of the sweetest baseball seen in any park. Good pitching backed up by nice fielding kept the crowd of five hundred fans on their toes every minute.

Sensational fielding by Murray Holden in centre field got a big hand from the crowd, particularly a somersault catch pulled off in the last innings. The local boys came up with a sparkling double play in the second, Raxlin at short, to Cook on second, to Minton at first.

Lorne "Porky" Schell went the distance for Stouffville and held the classy visitors to three scattered blows in the first three innings. With two out in the last innings and two strikes on McCarthy, Toronto catcher, Lorne just couldn't catch the corners for that third strike, and McCarthy got a free trip to first. The walk was followed by three singles by Seddan, Costelner and Small, and a double by Stephen, to bring in four runs and win the ball game.

Earls court opened the scoring in the third innings with a single run. A second run was nipped at the plate, Raxlin whipping a perfect throw to "Butch" Schell for the out. Stouffville came up with two runs in the fourth, Procenko getting a triple, and Rouse a single. The locals added one more in each of the fifth and sixth innings.

Toronto clung to their one run lead as Stouffville came to bat in the last of the seventh. They sent T. Seddan, who played minor professional in the Mid-Atlantic league last year, to the mound, to set down the three Stouffville batters.

Rouse and "Butch" Schell clipped out singles for Stouffville. Raxlin and Holden got a double each to their credit and Procenko a triple. Two strikeouts were registered by the three Toronto hurlers, while Schell sent three down swinging.

Seddan and Small were top hitters for Toronto, each getting two singles in four tries. Stephen and McCarthy each doubled. In the stolen base department, Stouffville came up with three and Toronto one.

Despite the loss, the close call and excellent brand of ball has kept the fans chattering every day since. The locals went into the game two men short, both Miller and Wideman being out of the lineup. Playoffs are just a couple of weeks off, and the hope is that the locals can continue in top shape.

Funeral Services for James Anderson

The funeral services for the late James Anderson, Sunderland druggist, who collapsed from a sudden coronary attack during a ball game at Sutton Wednesday evening of last week, were held on Saturday afternoon and were largely attended. Interment was made in Stone Church Cemetery, Thorah.

The late Mr. Anderson was in his 63rd year and had been pharmacist in Sunderland for over 35 years since coming there from his home town of Campbellford. He was in every activity of the district, a former president of the ball club, of the Brock Branch, Canadian Legion and had served for years as Trustee of the Police Village.

He was employed in Beaverton before going to Sunderland, where he married the former Ena Dunsheath and they have two surviving sons, Jack, prominent in baseball and in hockey, and a younger boy, George. An older boy, Kenneth, who was also quite prominent as a "Tiger" ball player and noted as fastest runner in the Tri-County League, died just prior to the last war, when still a young man.

The second game of the two-game series was scheduled for Memorial Park here this Tuesday night. Goodwood is standing by waiting for the winners, to go into the final round.

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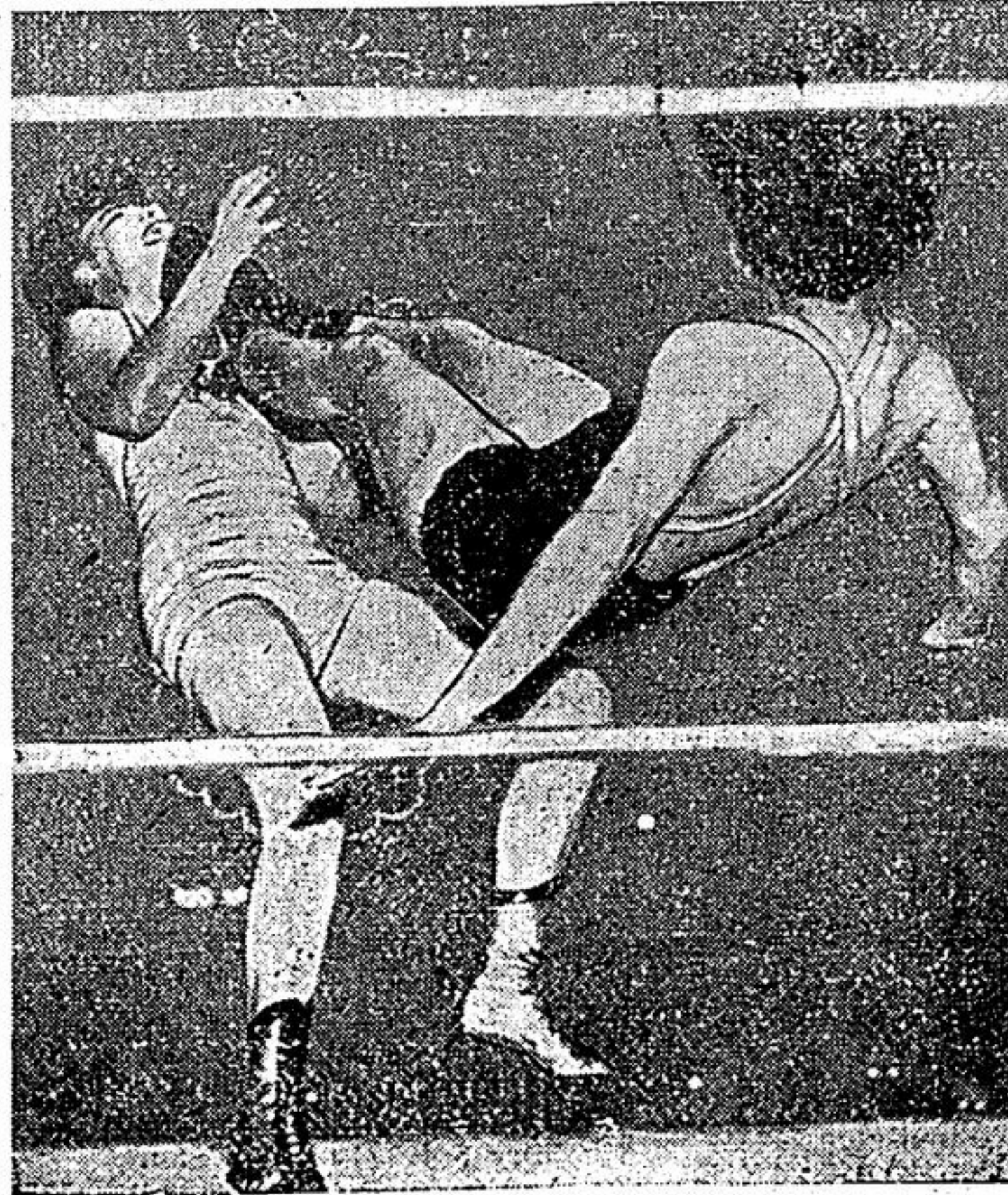
Horse Show and Fair Three Days at Sutton
