### Lower Mill Rate But Higher Taxes In Uxbridge Twp.

The Uxbridge Township Council held its August meeting Monday night with all members present, and the main business before the Council was that of striking the tax rates for the current year. Taxes will be higher this year, although since the assessment has been increased the mill rates are correspondingly lower.

The County levy is up by over \$2000 and the school taxes are increased by approximately \$2500. The levy for township purposes, which is the only rate that the council controls is down by about \$1100. The County rate is 8.5 mills, the township grants to schools 4.67 mills, and the rate for township purposes is 7.8 mills. The rates for trustees' requisitions varies according to the amount asked for and the assessment of each section.

The County Council at its last session passed a by-law authorizing payment of a bounty on foxes killed or destroyed and the Township Council passed a resolution appointing the clerk as Fox Bounty Officer for this municipality. Any persons desiring to claim a bounty on foxes killed in Uxbridge Township must apply to the clerk within forty-eight hours after killing, and must present the animal or its hide for identification.

The road account for July amounted to \$1074.45, and was passed for payment, as well as general accounts amounting to \$209.20.

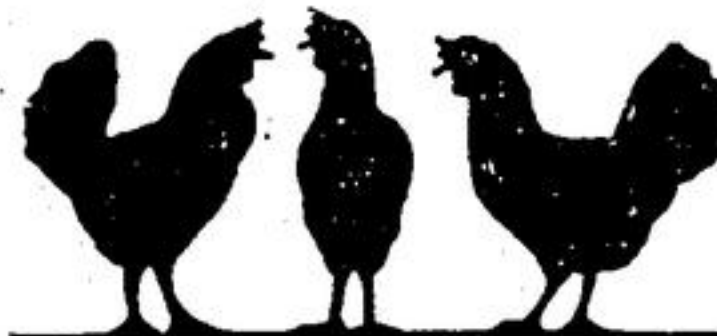
