## Firm to Make Television Equipment At Ajax

More than 14,000 square feet of floor space in the one-storey buildings erected at Ajax during the war for explosives manufacture, will be occupied shortly by a British firm, Pye Ltd., for manufacture of television and radio equipment, it has been revealed by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, a Dominion government agency.

Representatives of Pye Ltd. have been here and in Ottawa for five weeks, making final arrangements which have been approved by the Dominion Government, the Ontario Department of Planning and Development and the United Kingdom government.

It is expected that large numbers of residents of this district will be employed by the firm, although skilled technicians will come from Britain to make installations and start the new factory.
