TELL CANADIAN MENNONITES TO LEAVE IN SMALL GROUPS

Winnipeg, Aug. 23—Canadian Mennonites planning to settle in Paraguay have been advised to "emigrate in small groups—not in thousands."

R. B. Dubiński of Winnipeg, only non-Mennonite to sail in June with the advance guard of 1,600 of the sect, said on his return here that he was passing on the advice of Paraguayan immigration officials.

"They welcomed the party, but have not found it so easy to house all the people until the advance party is able to build communal dwellings for them on the land where they will settle," Mr. Dubiński said. He handled legal aspects of the transfer.

Dubiński said 1,200 Mennonites are housed in a vacant flour mill in the town of Villarrica, 140 miles from the fertile valley of the Caaguazu district, where the colony will be established.

One 6-year-old girl died when an outbreak of measles occurred. The child took ill during the voyage.

Mr. Dubiński said that Paraguayans were surprised at the amount of equipment brought with the Mennonites and extended a great welcome.

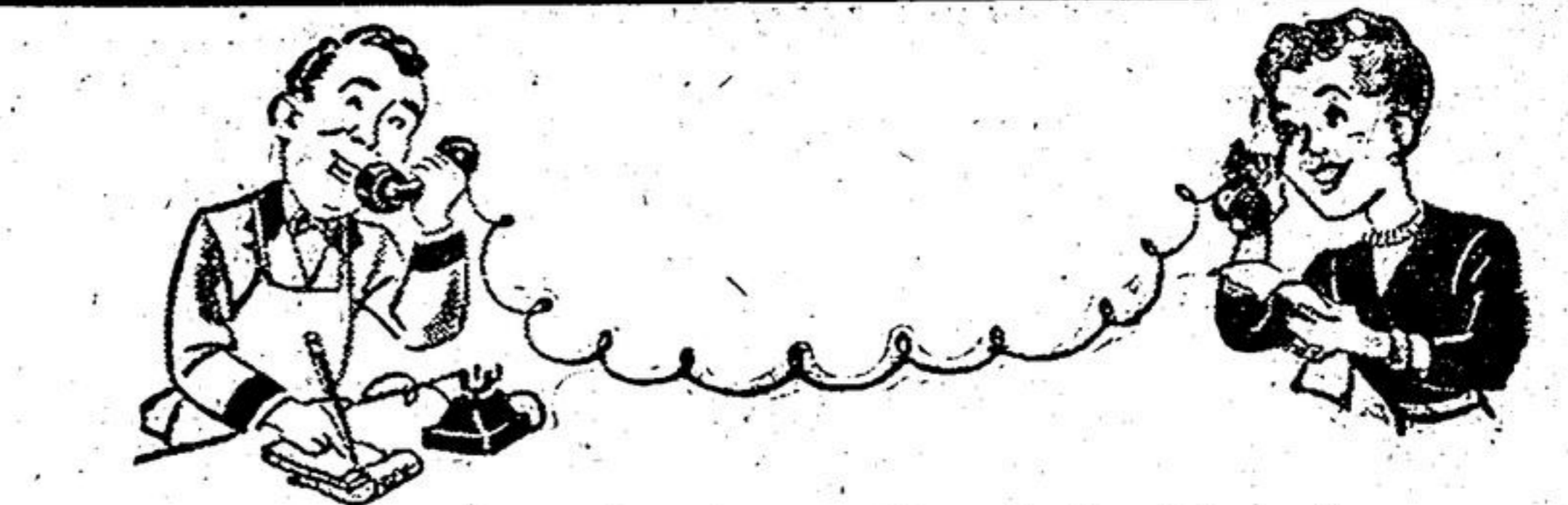

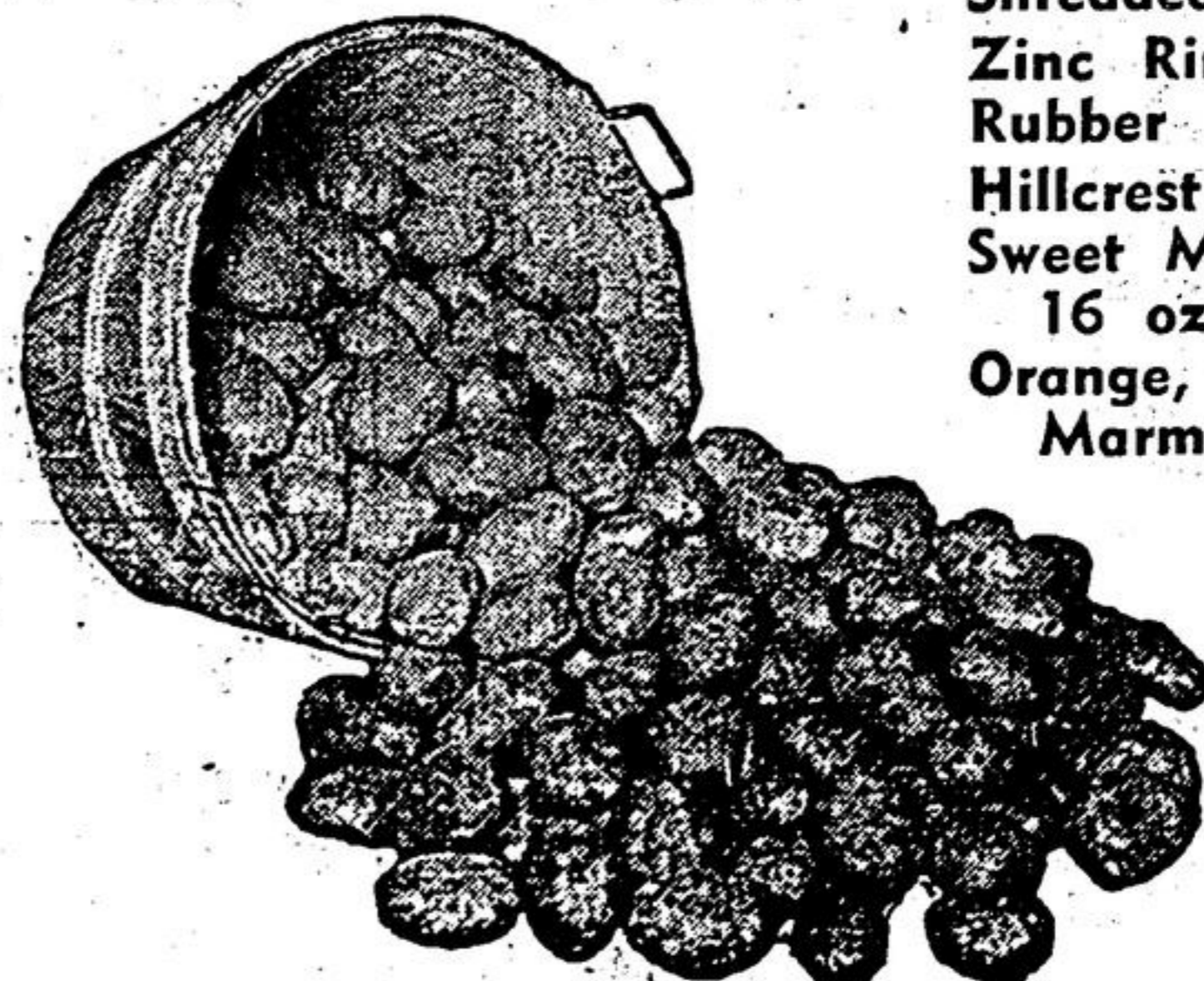
