Charged with Murder Youth Goes Back to Jail Till Fall Assizes

Frederick Aldred, 21, of Claremont, was committed by county Magistrate S. Atkinson for trial on a charge of murder, arising out of the shooting of William Cowan, Malvern storekeeper, on Aug. 21.

Cowan was shot when he got out of bed and armed with a revolver, went to investigate a strange noise in his store. Encountering an intruder, a fight ensued for the gun, during which Cowan was shot twice.

The magistrate said he refused to alter his decision made last Tuesday to commit the accused. The case had been continued Friday on request of Defense Counsel Harry Rose, who said he felt there was not enough evidence for a committal.

Charges of breaking and entering and stealing and attempted breaking and entering and stealing, which Aldred and his 17-year-old girl friend, May Hill, face jointly, also brought a committal for trial.

Defense counsel for Aldred objected to the Crown proceeding with the minor counts, declaring that it "seemed like a virgorous prosecution. I have never before heard of such a thing," he declared.

Magistrate Atkinson explained that the Crown attorney must have his reason for proceeding on the lesser charges. "A committal for trial will not hurt them," he asserted.

Miss Hill was released on \$3,000 bail.

In the murder hearing Rose called four crown witnesses to the stand. One of these, Christine Cowan, 18-year-old daughter of the dead man broke down in the stand when shown a gun. It is charged the weapon was used to kill her father.

Tears started rolling down her cheeks, but after a short pause she regained her composure.

"I heard dad in his drawer after his gun. As he was going by my door I heard him tell my mother to watch the window," she testified. "When he got downstairs I heard him yell 'May,' my mother's name."

She further testified that she heard her father ask, "What are you doing in here?" and "Where did you get in?" and "What are you doing with that gun."

"I heard no reply," she said.

Under cross-examination by defense counsel, Christine explained that when she ran into the store she saw her father with accused pinned against the wall and covering him with a gun in his right hand. She said she then left the store to go to the back to call a neighbor for help.

She said when she came back she saw accused and a girl running down the roadway.

Her sister, Ruth, 14-year-old high school student, gave virtually the same evidence, but added that accused had said, "I'll stand, I'll stand," when covered by her father's gun.

"Next thing I saw, accused made a jump towards my father and the gun dropped on the floor. Both of them were grappling for the gun and I heard two shots go off," Ruth said. "Dad was crouched on the floor and had a hold of the fellow's leg. Accused managed to break free and ran to the rear of the house, and my mother chased him."

"Dad staggered into the back of the store and took a long gun down off the wall. I asked him if anything was the matter and he did not answer," she went on.

DELAYED TOO LONG GETTING RID OF TEAM
