Intermediates Earn Right to Second Round of Playoffs

Ease Cambray Out of O.B.A. Picture in Two Straight Games

Stouffville Intermediates advanced into the second round of the O.B.A. playoffs last week by defeating Cambray, winners of the Tri-County league, in two straight games. The locals took the first game at home by the score of 9-8 in ten innings, and the second at Cambray 10-9.

Stouffville dragged 8-4 going into the last half of the eighth innings in the first game, only to come up with a quartette of runs to tie the score and then outlast the visitors in the extra innings.

Stouffville pitching has been a feature of both games. In the first game, Lorne Schell set down the northerners hitless for three innings, and was only replaced in the fifth by Lofty Miller, when his support wobbled badly.

Manager Ken Laushway played a big part in the extra innings win. In addition to retiring eleven of the Cambray batters, the second-base chief came through with a double in the tenth to score Raxlin from second and win the ball game.

Stouffville outthit Cambray fifteen to nine in their first meeting. Lew Raxlin had five hits in six times up, beating out a couple of bunts in sensational fashion. Lorne Schell had three for five, Laushway, three for six, and Minton a homer over 300 ft., in the second. In the errors department, Stouffville committed six and Cambray two.

At Cambray on Wednesday, the local nine again had to come from behind to take the decision. Miller who replaced Schell on the Stouffville mound in the fifth proved a real stumbling block to the Cambray heavy hitters, dishing up a cracking fast ball which the home team couldn't cope with. In addition, he drove the first ball offered to him in the sixth innings into deep left field for a homer with one on. With Stouffville leading by a single run in the eighth, Miller was nicked for a hit by Carl Tamblin. Tamblin stole his way to third and died there as Miller struck out the next three batters in order.

Patton was the only Cambray batter to come through with more than two hits, getting three for five. Cambray opened the game with a trio of runs, and had things looking pretty bleak for the Stouffvillites who committed five errors, allowing three unearned runs.

Rouse who had been on the bench for a couple of games was thrown into the breach at third base in both games, and came through nicely both at the hot corner and at bat.

Nearly a thousand people were on hand for Wednesday's game at Cambray, where interest has been running high all season.

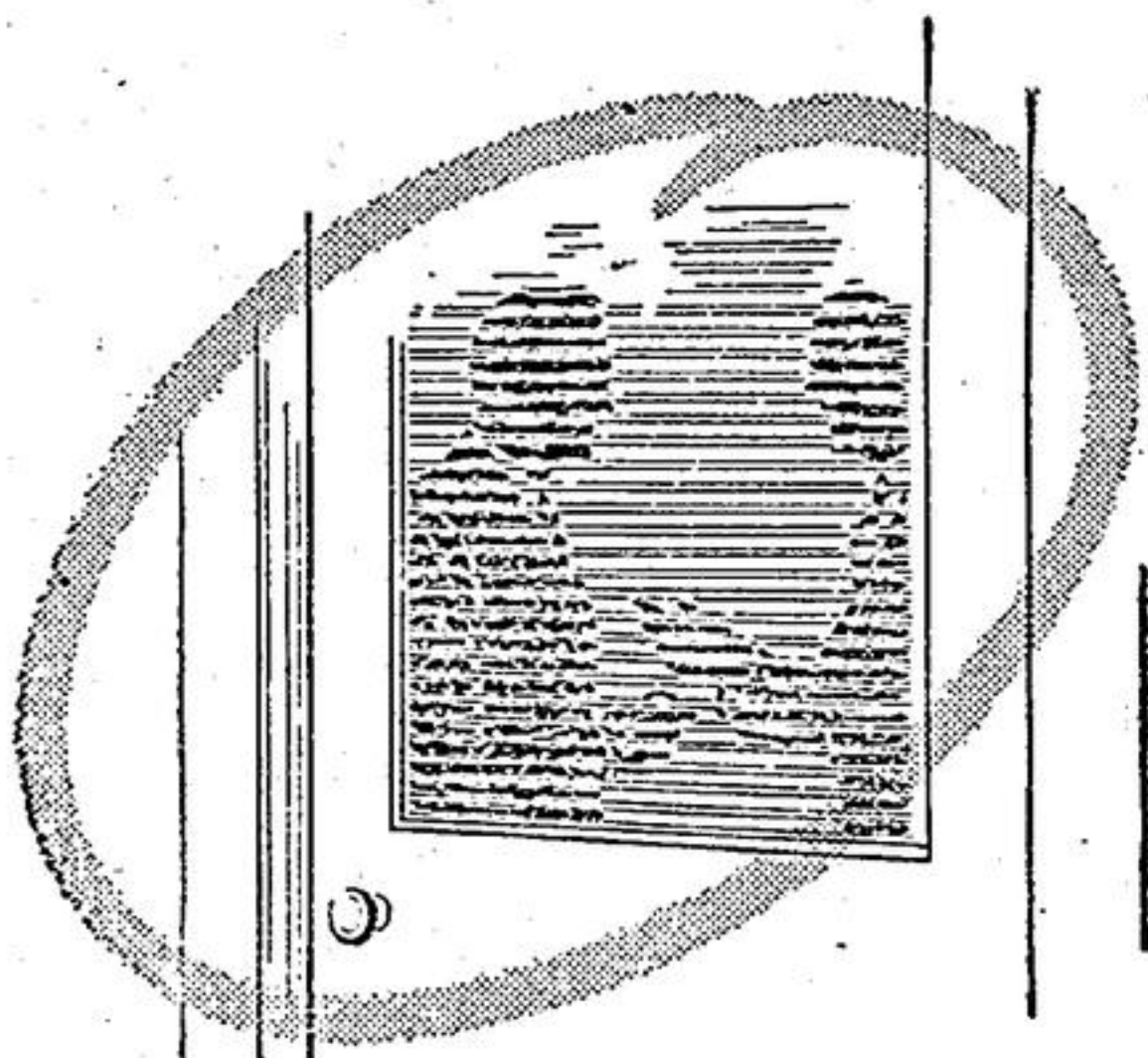
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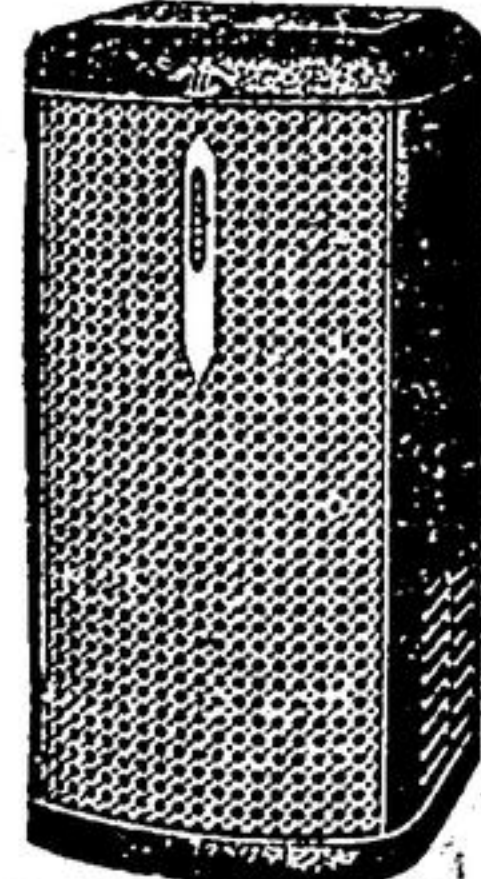
