Mrs. Malcolm, superintendent of the Brierbush Hospital was expected to arrive back in Stouffville this Wednesday evening after a delightful holiday in England. Information reached here that Mrs. Malcolm would leave the flying field in England on Tuesday in time to be home this Wednesday night.

Stouffville Would Benefit from St. Lawrence Development

If the St. Lawrence waterways development ever comes to maturity Stouffville and the district about will feel the benefit in a very direct way. Instead of unloading overseas cargoes for Ontario at Montreal and sending them down by rail, boats would come right up to Toronto, and the two or three thousand dock hands now paid at Montreal to handle Ontario goods, would be stationed or employed at the city docks. They would live, many of them in and about the Stouffville-Markham district.

However, politics in Canada, but more particularly in the United States has barred the commencement of the scheme. The Ottawa government is sitting pat on any decision respecting the proposed development of power on the Ottawa River, as urged by the Ontario government. It would finally form part of the over-all proposed plan to deepen the waterways for ocean-going vessels from Toronto.

Last week it was announced that the U.S. Federal Power Commission would begin hearings on Oct. 1 about granting a license to the New York Power Authority for its part in the proposed power scheme. Since Leland Olds, chairman of the EPC is a former member of the New York Authority it is expected that the license will be granted subject to approval by the International Joint Commission and other necessary authorities. Chairman Robert Saunders of the Ontario Hydro is expected to testify before the Commission when it opens hearings in Washington next month.

There is no doubt that the Federal Government is anxious to postpone hearings by the International Joint Commission on the purely power proposal if there is any opportunity in the near future of getting a combined water and power scheme approved at Washington. It is feared that if the power scheme itself goes ahead without the waterways, then Canada may lose the very favorable terms with the opportunity to get its power waterway completed along the lines proposed and agreed to by the United States in 1941.
