It would have been a great pity had that stand of timber in the heart of the township fallen to flames. It was pointed out that the area is bone dry and stands in eminent danger until a good rainfall relieves the situation.

In any event, the disclosure will likely deter any council from issuing a blanket order to refuse aid to burning cars.

From an over-all standpoint, it is realized that each fire fought costs the tax payers real money, yet not a burdensome sum, and because a car passing through the municipality might get on fire, suggestions have been made to cancel aid to this type of trouble.
