

PRIZE WINNERS AT KING AND VAUGHAN PLOWING MATCH

An attendance of around 2500 was estimated by officials for King and Vaughan plowing match held Oct. 26th, on the farm of Norman Bryson, Vaughan township, which provided a very choice site and under excellent weather conditions. Fifty-three entries with the majority in tractor classes completed the most successful match, over several years.

Winner of the Junior Farmer special for the best plowed land, Norman Tyndall, Richmond Hill, captured the Silver Cup by Eaton Hall and the Gold Watch by T. Eaton Co. in stubble tractor class open to residents of King and Vaughan, former first prize winners barred, outclassing eight competitors in this event. Tied for first place a flip of the coin placed Robert Timbers of Stouffville, first, and Ernie Evans of Maple, second, in the open tractor sod class competed by nine plowmen.

Jimmie Thomas, 11, of Maple, winner of the stubble horse plowing class for boys of King and Vaughan, 14 years and under, also won the special as youngest plowman of the day. He took this event in the same match last year. Catherine Diceman, 16, Queensville, the only member of the fair sex to enter the field, won special as youngest girl competitor.

Jack Couperthwaite, of Agincourt, carried the Esso Champion Tractor Special for best land in tractor sod classes by resident of York County. Salada Tea special for best land in Jointer Sod Classes for horses went to Norman Jarvis, Markham. William O'Brien, 14, of Maple won the Ford Special, adding crown and finish specials.

Bruce Timbers, 15, Stouffville, placed first in tractor stubble class open to boys 16 years and under. Eugene Timbers, 15, of Milliken, placed first for boys 18 and under, stubble with horses.

Following a full course dinner at night served by the ladies of Laskay United Church and Strange Presbyterian Congregation, at Laskay church basement, prizes were awarded at Laskay Institute Hall, with president, Gordon Orr, chairman. PARENTS HEAR SAD NEWS OVER RADIO OF SON'S DEATH

When Harold Beach of Uxbridge was killed last week when he came into contact with a live wire while working in Scarborough, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Beach of Uxbridge, received the sad news over the radio as the first intimation of their son's fate. It was a terrible shock, but the news leaked out before authorities had time to communicate with the family.

Follow-up workmen told police that Beach, employed by the Beamish Construction Co., was helping with the installation of cement pipes when the accident occurred. The pipes were being raised by means of a chain attached to a crane. The crane contacted an overhead feeder line from the Leaside sub-station, and Beach who was helping guide the pipe, received the full force of the shock.

Beach was removed to the office of Dr. J. M. Colthart, Pape ave., where he died a few minutes later. Coroner Dr. W. L. Christie said that an inquest would be held.
