Familiar Figure in Local Baseball Dead

Funeral services were held on Wednesday for Ernest Theo Hale of Mimico, former Aurora resident, who died suddenly. He is survived by his widow and two children and at the time of his death was employed at Anaconda Brass Ltd. He was in his 42nd year.

North York baseball fans of the 20's will recall the late Theo Hale as one of the greatest pitchers to ever perform in these parts. Hale matched strides with Earl Cook, Bas. McHale, Lou. Lehman, Chuck Thoms, Lefty LeChapelle, Hal. Learoyd, hurling high class ball in those days for Stouffville, Newmarket, Sutton, etc. He possessed blinding speed, fairly good control, and a fine assortment of hooks and if he had cared to make baseball a career as did Earl Cook, he could easily have done so.

Local Hockey Team May Yet be Seniors

Stouffville Intermediates may yet be elevated to the Senior 'B' classification before schedule time rolls around. Under Senior rating, Stouffville believe they would be free of all player entanglement in the area, as there are no other Senior teams in the district where these players could go. Lindsay entry is Senior 'B', also Orillia, and Diggins of Richmond Hill will also be Senior if they operate. However, none of these teams are drawing players within the local orbit.

While this point has not been fully decided, and the team is still Intermediate 'A', top members of the Club have been discussing the possible move to Senior hockey.

"So You Want Peace" Address by Talented Speaker At Lions Club

"So You Want Peace," was the topic address given before the Stouffville Lions Club meeting on Monday evening, by Capt. G. A. Tutty, director of the Readers Digest.

Capt. Tutty told the members that for years we on this continent had been bombarded by isms, but he believed we still have the bestism of all, be it Canadianism or Americanism.

From ancient times, those men, such as John the Baptist, Jesus, Gandhi, and latest Count Bernadotte, who had appeared on the horizons of civilization, desperately wanting peace, more than anything else in the world, had been cast aside.

Speaking principally on Russia, the speaker pointed out that in the Kremlin are clever, crafty men, who are bent on bringing their ism to the rest of the world.

"But they can't do it here, if we are true to ourselves," he stated. "Russia will fail," he said, "because they have lost the message of truth that Jesus gave."

To a large extent, Capt Tutty told the Lions, the Communists are bluffing, and it will be a long time before they challenge us in arms.

Speaking of Democracy, he said it was not perfect by any means, but we were trying.

Capt. Tutty is an American, a world traveller, associated with some of the top-flight editors in the United States. He said that he has seen Europe and the East, and that our country has something, difficult to describe in the matter of freedom.

"However, if we tangle with Russia, and I have no doubt we will, eventually, many of us here will not remain to see it," he continued.

The Captain believes that the next ten years will tell the story.

In answer to questions from members of the Club, the speaker stated that it would be four years before Russia would be able to bring out a bomb as effective as that used by U.S. in the last war. The United States has some terrible weapons tested, but he did not believe they would ever be used, but to defend this continent, from aggression.

Speaking of the effect of the over-run of a large part of China by the Communist forces, Capt. Tutty said that the Chiang Ki Shek regime was not good, and was probably as much at fault for the plight of China as the Communist.

Correspondents and airmen who return are disgusted at the corrupt way in which Chinese government officials exploit the people for

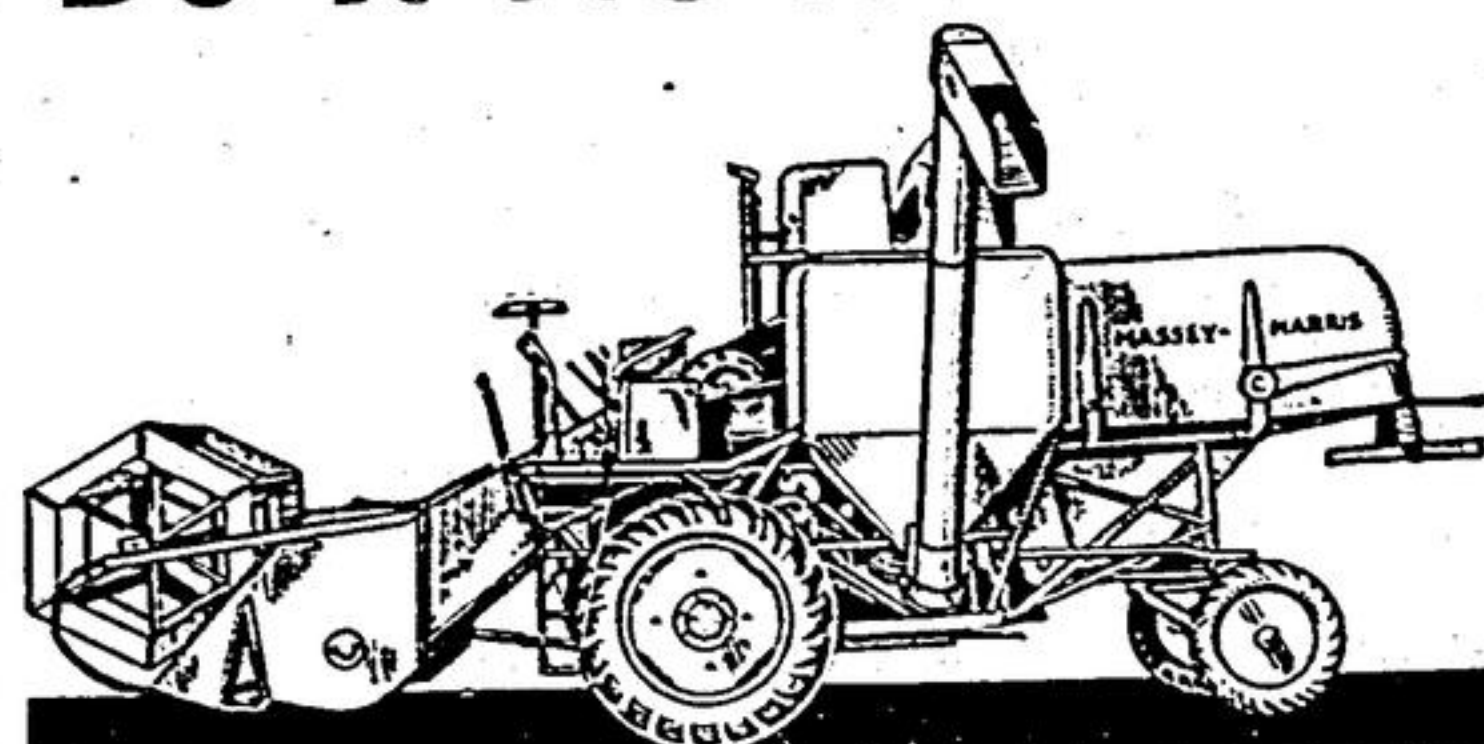
Asked if the United Nations had failed, he replied that no great philosophy ever fails. However, he said that the UN lacked teeth, and was only "about twenty percent effective."
