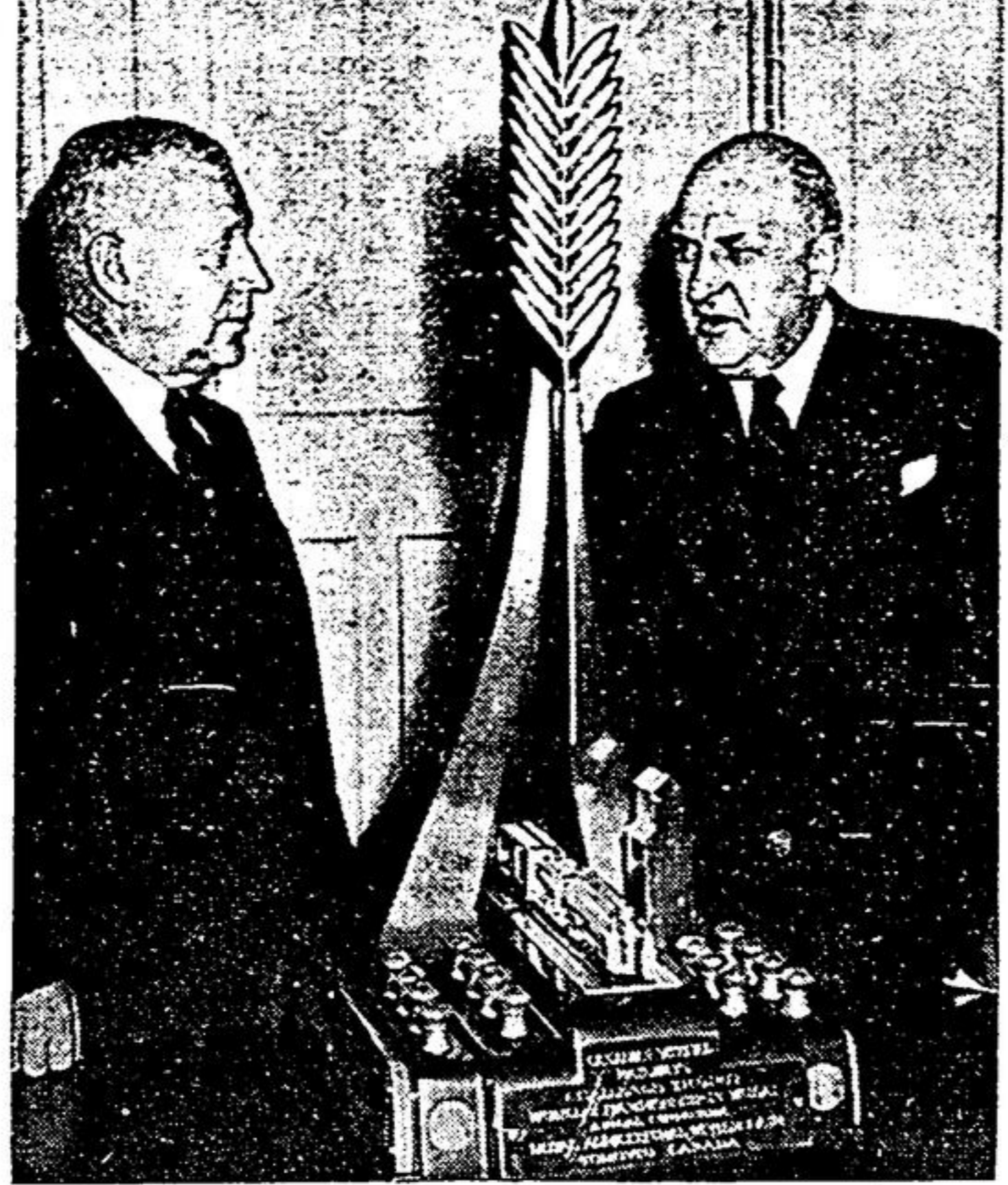

JUDGE SUING PHONE
COMPANY FOR 48 CENTS
 Sault Ste. Marie, Nov. 20—Acting
 as a private citizen, Municipal
 Judge John E. Larock has brought
 suit against the Michigan Bell Tele-
 phone Co. for recovery of 48 cents
 overcharged on his most recent
 bill.
 Judge Larock paid a \$3 court fee
 to file his case in municipal court
 before a special judge, Mahlon
 Stewart.

the recent raise in phone rates.

No Place Like Home

There are 79 in this one
 Suit without Buttons Aim of One
 Inmate—Another Demands Red
 Patches on New Trousers

The Old Peoples' Home on
 Yonge street maintained by the
 County of York, comes up for
 annual discussion at County Council,
 and the report presented this
 year by Reeve Cook of Aurora was
 a particularly well prepared docu-
 ment. It revealed the fact that there
 are 79 inmates in the home, 48 men,
 and 31 women.

The average age of the men is 71
 years, and of the 31 women their
 average age is 74. There were five
 persons discharged during the year,
 and 12 admitted to residence. Eight
 persons died during the year.

Practically all the inmates at the
 Home are in receipt of the pen-
 sion, but the county claim the
 cheques each month in payment for
 their keep, with the exception of
 \$5 which is allowed each of the
 elderly guests for their own use.
 Clothing, meals, reading matter,
 including papers, magazines and
 books are supplied in abundance,
 and good warm quarters hence
 there is little to spend the \$5 on,
 other than a few personal things.
 Even candy and gifts are brought
 to the old folks at odd times by
 organizations, and the county
 supply the men with tobacco.

Persons who are not in fair
 health according to standards of
 elderly people are not admitted to
 the home, as it is not a hospital.
 However, when one of the residents
 becomes ill, they are taken care of
 and sent to hospital if necessary
 and returned to the Home when
 recovery is made. There is
 usually a dozen or more unable to
 come to the dining hall for meals
 who must be served in bed.

Church services are held regu-
 larly conducted by various minis-
 ters representing different denomi-
 nations and visiting days are
 standard so that persons may see
 old friends. Likewise, they may take
 the elderly occupant to their home
 for any period of days which is a
 treat many enjoy.

The Home has 130 acres of land
 and a fine herd of cattle, poultry
 and other stock. The old people
 who are able are given a share in
 the work, gardening and such like
 in summer that they really like to do.

All in all its a great family with
 Major and Mrs. Sprague at the
 helm, and their task is no easy one,
 you may be sure. Old people have
 strange ways, persistent and deter-

mined such as the elderly chap who
 insists in cutting every button off
 his clothing, and this goes for a
 brand new suit too. Then there is
 the chap who wants a red patch on
 his trousers, so the first thing he
 does when he gets a new pair from
 the store room is to get away in a
 corner, cut a hole and place the red
 ensign on it. After all, it could be
 a safety measure if the old fellow
 does much walking on Yonge street.
 There is an odd person who does
 not hear well, and wants the radio
 at thunder pitch, against the wishes
 of a mild spoken old fellow who
 just does not like noise. These and
 many more are problems for Major
 and Mrs. Sprague. But they settle
 them so diplomatically county
 officials hear little or no complaint
 at all.
