SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(Lesson for December 12)
 Golden Text.—These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God; that ye may know that ye have eternal life.—1 John 5:13

The Lesson as a Whole
 Approach to the Lesson

It is an evidence of our gracious God's deep interest in and love for His people that He has revealed so much of His truth in the form of letters. In these Epistles He speaks to us out of the fullness of His heart, through inspired servants, in a most effective and appealing way. There are twenty-one Epistles in the New Testament besides the seven Letters to the churches in Asia which are incorporated in the Book of the Revelation. Letters are the simplest and most intimate of all forms of literature and give opportunity for the outlet of the emotions as nothing else does. Thirteen of these Letters are attributed directly to Paul, and while there are differences of opinion as to the authorship of Hebrews, it, too, is considered as his by many. The other epistolary writers are James, Peter, John, and Jude.

Of all these Letters, that to the Philippians is perhaps the most intensely practical. It is pre-eminently the Epistle of Christian experience, which consists in the knowledge, enjoyment, and manifestation of Christ. The four chapters form distinct divisions. In chapter one the theme is Christ, the believer's life (v. 21), and linked with that the Gospel mind or evangelistic spirit (v. 27). In chapter two we have Christ the believer's example vs. 5, 6) and the lowly mind or humble spirit (vs. 2, 3). Chapter three gives us Christ as the believer's object (v. 8) and the steadfast mind (v. 15) or expectant spirit (v. 20). In chapter four we have Christ the believer's strength (v. 13) and the trustful mind (v. 6) or submissive spirit (v. 11). There is a note of joy that runs through the entire Letter as the apostle enlarges upon our privileges and responsibilities.

The Historical Setting
 Philippi was the first city in Europe in which Paul preached, and although at first there seemed very little interest and the apostle and his companion, Silas, were imprisoned, yet they left a church behind them which grew and flourished in a remarkable way. Paul revisited this church on several occasions and he wrote this Epistle to them when Ephroditus came from Philippi to Paul's prison in Rome, bearing gifts sent by the church to alleviate his difficult circumstances. The approximate date of the Letter was A.D. 64.

Verse by Verse
 Phil. 1:1.—"To all the saints..... which are at Philippi." Saints are separated ones—those who have been set apart to God in Christ. This is true of all genuine Christians. Note that in this salutation Paul mentions in a special way; the "bishops" and "deacons" as officially representing the church and so responsible for the gifts sent him.

Verse 2.—"Grace be unto you, and peace." It was not the grace that saves to which he referred, but the daily supply of grace for each need as it arises. Nor was he writing of peace with God (Rom. 5:1) which is the portion of every believer, but rather of the peace of God which keeps the heart at rest in all circumstances.

Verse 3.—"I thank my God upon every remembrance of you." Fellowship had been very real and the apostle rejoiced as he called to mind all he had known of them in days gone by.

Verse 4.—"In every prayer..... for you all making request with joy." His heart went out to the entire company of believers and he delighted to make intercession for them.

Verse 5.—"Fellowship in the gospel." Note the many references to the Gospel—the glad tidings of God's grace—in this Epistle. Fellowship is more than mere companionship. It suggests a common interest, and in this instance unity in witnessing for Christ,

either by word of mouth or by providing the means for others to go on in evangelistic work.

Verse 6.—"He which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ." When the Holy Spirit begins a work in the soul of a believer He can be depended on to bring it to perfection. He never gives up one who has been born of the Word and Spirit of God.

Verse 7.—"Ye all are partakers of my grace." By their expressions of true fellowship the Philippian saints made it manifest that they were partners with the apostle in the great work committed to him—a work which even imprisonment could not stop.

Verse 8.—"I long after you all." Those whom he had led to Christ were very dear to the heart of Paul. There is a close link between the Gospel preacher and those converted through his ministry.

Verse 9.—"I pray that your love may abound..... in knowledge and in all discernment." Divine love implanted in the soul should ever expand and abound. But it is not to be at the expense of condoning evil. Love is to be coupled with that knowledge which is found in the Word of God and that discernment which the Holy Spirit gives. Only too often all kinds of false teaching and even living are excused on the plea that love does not take account of such things. But we need to remember that the love of God is a holy love.

Verse 10.—"Approve things that are excellent," or test the things that differ. The Word of God is the criterion by which all is to be tested or tried. Where one is controlled by the Word, he will be "sincere and without offence till the day of Christ." The day of Christ is the day of manifestation, when the works of all believers will be revealed at the judgment seat of Christ and we shall be rewarded or suffer loss according as we have honored God or let self have its way.

Verse 11.—"The fruits of righteousness." We are told that the "effect of righteousness" shall be "quietness and assurance for ever" (Isa. 32:17). These are the fruits that are produced in the heart as a result of walking before God in righteousness.

Chap. 4:8.—"Think on these things." Those graces mentioned in this verse which adorn the Christian and indicate his true character are ever to be kept before us. If we dwell on that which is evil, impure, and unlovely, we ourselves become perverted in mind and heart. As we contemplate the things that are holy and well reported of we are ennobled and blessed ourselves.

Verse 9.—"The God of peace shall be with you." As we learn to commit all our affairs to God (vs. 6, 7). As we walk according to the admonitions and example of the apostle as set forth in this Letter we enjoy fellowship with the God of peace.

The Heart of the Lesson
 As Christians we are called upon to recognize our responsibility to glorify God in this scene. It is as we enthroned Christ in our hearts and are identified with His interests in the world that we enjoy that communion with Him and with like-minded believers which means so much to us as we seek to give out the Gospel message to needy men and women all about us. Christ Himself is our example. His mind is to be manifested in us. This delivers us from selfishness and pride, thus fitting us to serve Him acceptably.
