Following a serious illness which lasted over nine weeks the majority of which were spent in Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto, Fitz Henry Webb passed peacefully away on Thursday morning, December 16. Born at Newmarket, Cambridge-shire, England in 1868, the early part of his life was spent as a coachman and groom. In 1890 he enlisted in the 18th Hussars of the Imperial Army and his 12 years of service with the Hussars was abroad in India and South Africa for seven years taking part in the Boer War and being in the siege of Ladysmith. In 1897 at Peter Martitzburg he married Rosetta Amelia Passant. In 1912 Mr. Webb and his oldest son came to Canada and his wife and three children followed later. He also enlisted in the 256 Battalion of the Canadian Forces and went with same to England and France in World War I, after which he farmed near Uxbridge. In recent years he disposed of his farm and resided with his daughter Mrs. Ben Smith at Prince Albert, Ontario. He led an active life and enjoyed good health till his present illness.
