Council Makes Annual Appointments At Inaugural

A number of routine appointments and committees were set up at the inaugural meeting of Pickering Township's 1949 council, on Monday afternoon. Dr. L. Loos was re-engaged as Sanitary Inspector at a salary of \$400. Dr. Loss was also Truant Officer last year, a position which he declined this term. W. C. Willson was appointed sheep valuator and D. B. Annis and Frank Disney were named as members of the Board of Health. W. C. Ellicott will remain as Weed Inspector at a remuneration of 50c per hour with 7c mileage. Lloyd Johnston, clerk, will continue as Relief Officer at a salary of \$100.

"We should have a signed agreement whenever we approach another man's property, in case of a misunderstanding," stated Deputy-Reeve Frank Disney.

Mr. Disney's statement arose during a discussion with Frank Carter over a roadside which had been cleaned up, partly by the township and partly by Mr. Carter. There was a difference of opinion over the sharing of the cost.

Pickering Village Trustees held a lengthy interview with the council concerning the vote to be taken in the village on the question of municipal waterworks.

Dr. N. E. McEwen, former deputy-reeve asked council why his name did not appear on the voters' list for Pickering Village. The Doctor was informed by Assessor Spears that since he did not live in the village, his name

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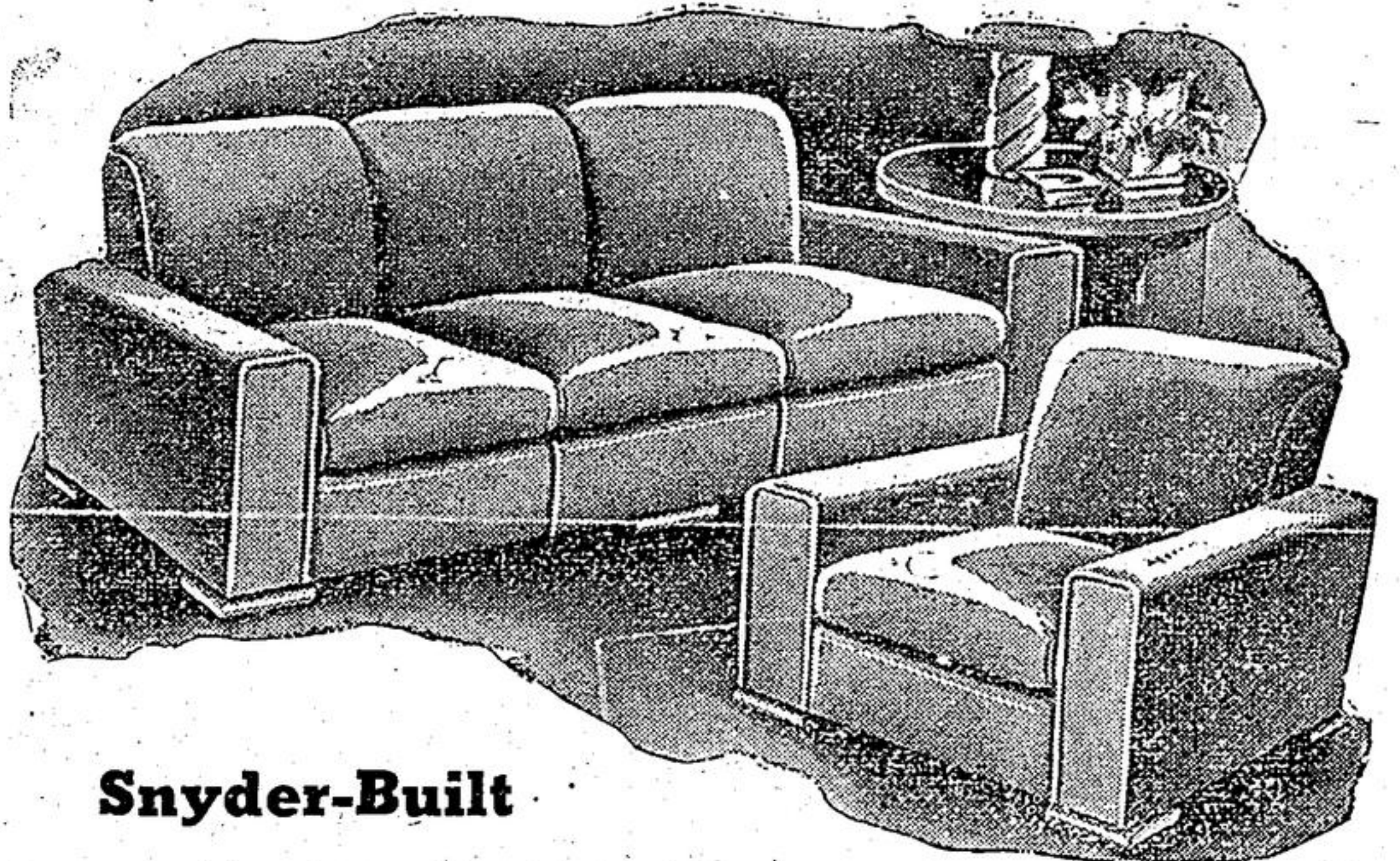
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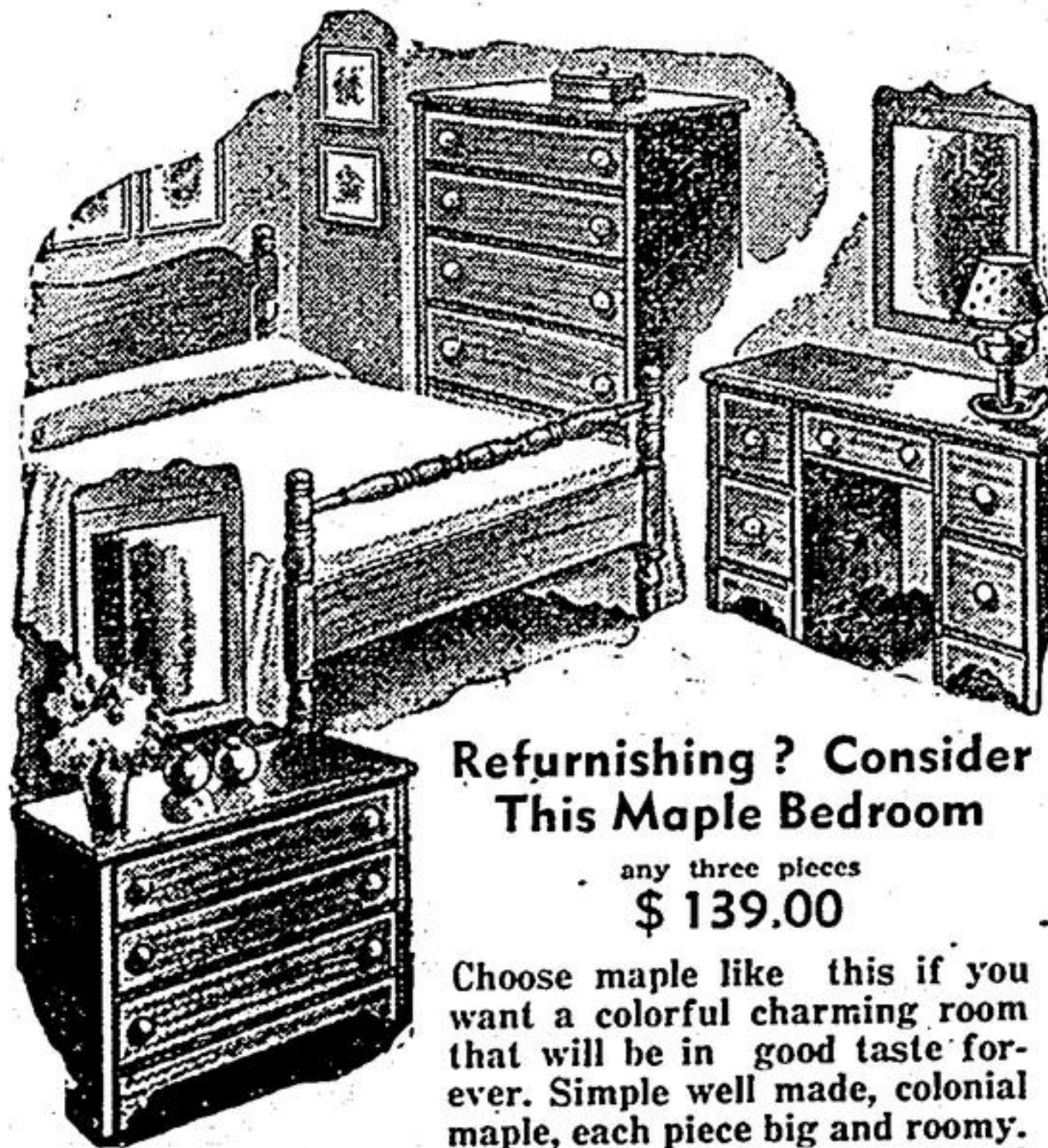


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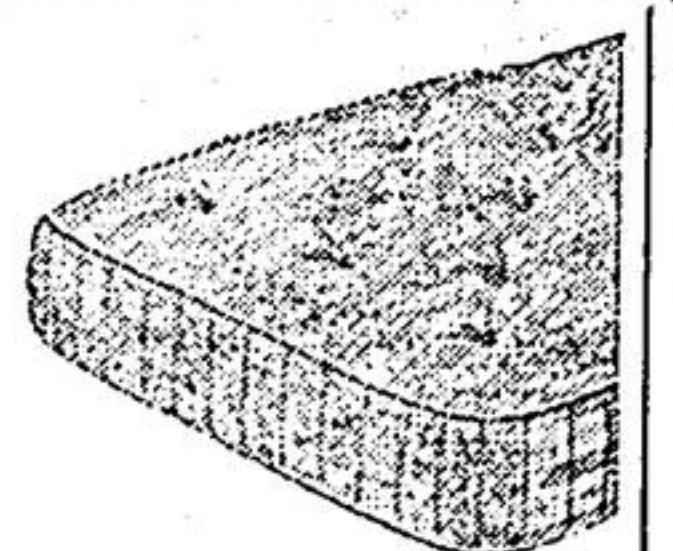
