WON'T GIVE UP

After seven weeks of Ottawa bureaucracy's full treatment for tax delinquents, George Simpson, of Pembroke, Ont., jeweler, still is confident that, as the symbol of the aroused "little man" of Canadian democracy, he can win his one-man revolt against postwar federal taxation policy. Three court convictions, each of which may carry a maximum fine of \$1,000 or one year in prison, haven't wilted his crusading ardor. 
