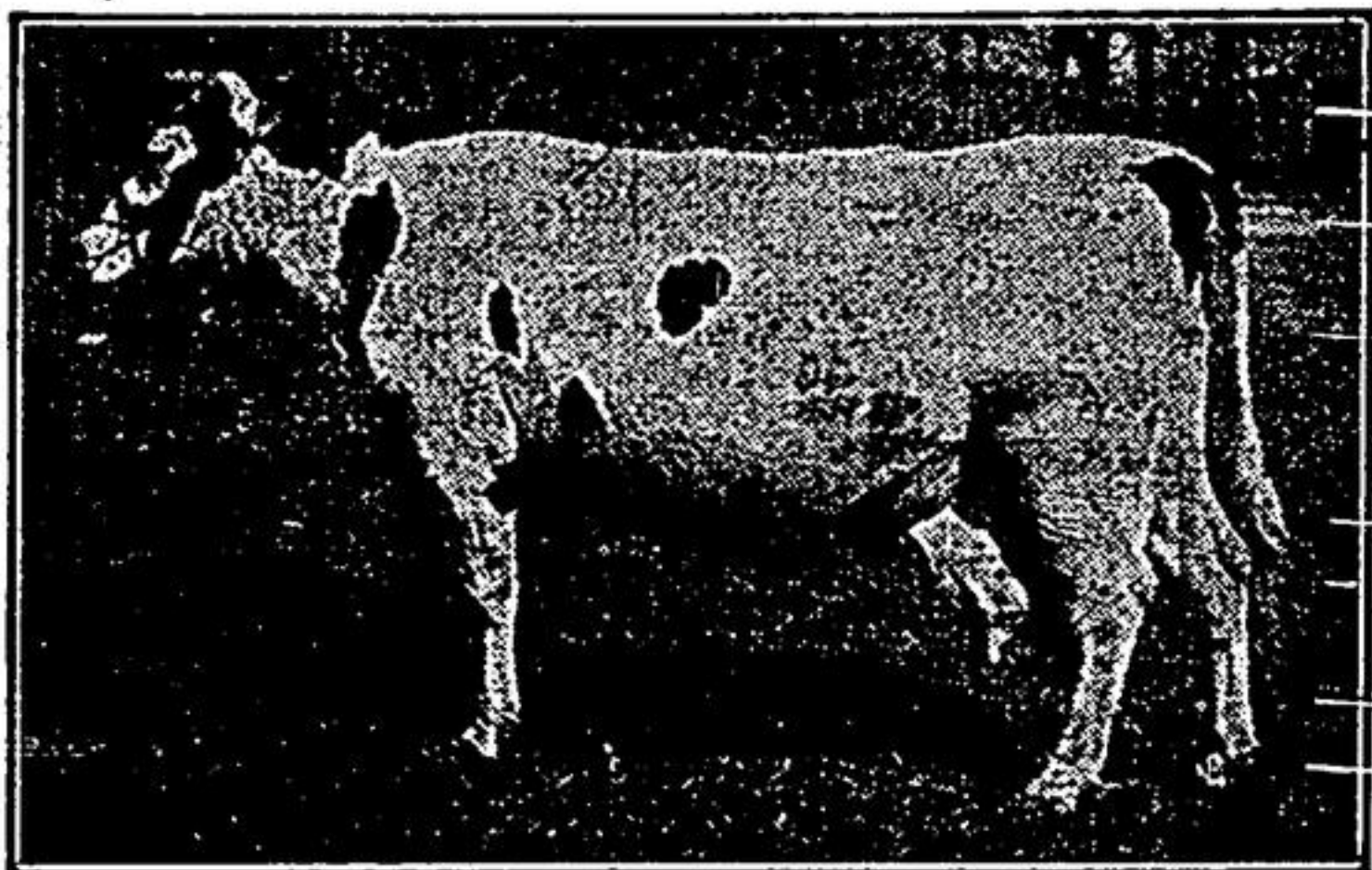

568 Foxes Killed In Ontario County Last Year

68 in Pickering Township and 60 in Uxbridge Township

Payment of fox bounties has cost the county of Ontario a total of \$2,329 in six and a half months, Clerk William Manning told county council Friday. During the latter half of 1948 a \$3 bounty was in effect and 568 pelts were certified costing the county -1,661.

As of December 8, 1948, the bounty was increased to \$5 with the result that business has been booming for hunters ever since. It is expected ultimately to lead to the near eradication of foxes. This month from the first to the 15th day, \$665 was paid out on 147 applications. A lesser amount is paid on pelts of pups.

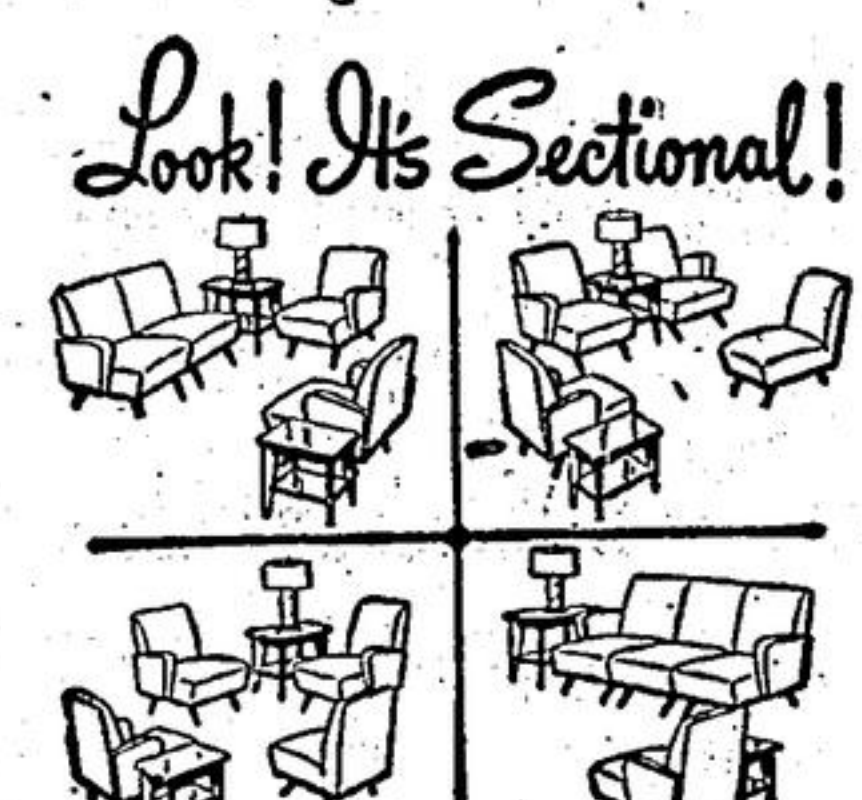
