Several additions to the Toronto Meteors, Peterborough Petes and Bell A.C. teams were given the okay by the O.H.A. sitting in special session last week. Likewise, only the points which Peterborough Legion, Peterborough Petes, Bell A.C. and Toronto Meteors make playing together will count in their standing. Bobcaygeon, being the only Intermediate 'B' club, will receive a bye into the Ontario 'B' playoffs.

This plan was not the system originally set up at the convener's meeting, but recent word from the O.H.A. headquarters has changed the setup to that set out above.

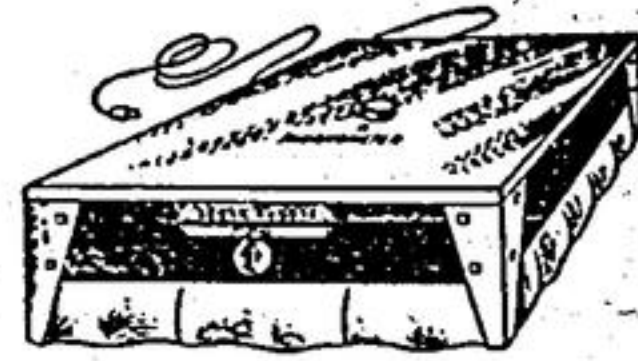
Juveniles Open Group Playoffs Next Week
